

TAITANO ENTERS TODAY ON DUTY AS DEPUTY HICOM

It has been reported by the Office of Territories personnel officer, Mrs. J. M. Vidi, that former Director of Office of Territories Richard F. Taitano, is entering on duty as Deputy High Commissioner of the Trust Territory as of April 10.

The new Deputy High Commissioner's arrival in Saipan is not known as yet.

Freighter Expected Tomorrow in Koror—TO UNLOAD VAN CAMP EQUIPMENT

The MS JAGLAXMI, a 17000 gross-ton freighter chartered by the Van Camp Sea Foods Company, is expected to enter Palau's harbor approaches Saturday morning (April 11) with 610 tons of machinery and supplies abroad for use in the construction of the company's planned facilities in the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

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Officials of the Van Camp concern said the services of Captain Alex O'Neill have been secured to pilot the vessel in and out of the Palau harbor approaches and to take charge of the off-loading of the equipment. Captain O'Neill was the former master of the Trust Territory vessel GUNNERS KNOT.

Herbert Schuch, Van Camp construction engineer, is already in Palau awaiting the necessary material to build a 1,500-ton fish storage freezer, ice making machines, water storage tanks, and office spaces to carry out the planned tuna fishing program in Palau's waters. The plant is expected to be fully operational by July 1.

Six 25 gross-ton tuna boats will begin operating from Koror's main port with 72 Okinawans and 48 Palauans as crewmen and fishermen. Under the provisions of the contract signed by the Trust Territory and Van Camp officials, Palauans or other Micronesians will be trained as tuna fishermen with the ultimate goal of all boats manned by Micronesians.

LIT. PROD. OFFICER APPOINTED

Mr. Roberts was the former Director of the South Pacific Commission Literature Bureau in Sydney, Australia, and will need little introduction to those staff members who are familiar with his previous activities. He visited the Territory in his former capacity.

In his new position with the Trust Territory, Mr. Roberts has been requested by the High Commissioner to undertake a current analysis of our needs in the literature production field. In this respect, Mr. Roberts is expected to visit all districts soon.

Mr. Roberts relieves Community Development Officer Robert McKnight who has been directing the Literature Production Center on an interim basis. LPC will continue as a section under the present Program Office activities.
