Madolenihmw mayor speaks out on sea cucumber project

Pohnpei, FSM — Petrick Ringlen, Madolenihmw's chief elected official says that he considers the commercial sea cucumber operation in Madolenihmw to be a pilot project and that so far no money has been made.

Madolenihmw signed a memorandum of understanding with American

business man Thomas Son to farm greenfish sea cucumbers for export. The program has been a subject of controversy and a large number of rumors.

First of all, Pohnpei law does not allow for exportation of marine resources unless they are farmed products.

Joseph Saimon of Pohnpei's Office of Fishing and Aquaculture said that two weeks ago representatives of his office went to

Chuuk State enacts bill to protect sharks

Micronesia is a step closer to regional shark sanctuary

All four of the Federated States of Micronesia, or FSM, have enacted shark protections, now that the state of Chuuk has passed legislation that bans shark fishing in its waters. Governor Johnson Elimo signed the measure May 8, 2014, in a ceremony in the state capital, Weno.

The state legislature passed the bill in early April, shortly after it was introduced by Senator Nelson Stephen.

“Sharks are worth more alive than dead,” Stephen said. “I am delighted that Chuuk has enacted legislation to keep these culturally and economically significant species protected for generations to come.”

Chuuk, located in the western Pacific Ocean, is a world-renowned scuba diving destination. It boasts dozens of World War II-era shipwrecks in its waters. Chuuk is also known for its sharks, which are attracted by the marine life that lives among the sunken wrecks.

“Chuuk shows that small islands can take big steps to protect sharks,” said Imogen Zethoven, director of The Pew Charitable Trusts’ global shark conservation campaign. “We applaud the state for protecting these ancient creatures.”

Cindy Hall, manager of the Truk Lagoon Dive Center in Chuuk, told Pew in 2012 that tourism drives the state’s economy—and diving is a critical component of that industry.

“One diver can bring in several thousand dollars per trip. They pay the diver fees, including the government’s \$30 user fee, but they also stay in hotels, rent cars, and eat in our restaurants,” Hall said, adding that sharks help attract divers.

“Shark diving is a sustainable business, whereas commercial shark fishing is not,” she said. “We can bring divers out to Shark Island every day, but a fisherman would only be able to fish it once and the

sharks would be gone.”

One study done in the western Pacific island nation of Palau found that the one-time value of a dead reef shark was US\$108. A living shark, on the other hand, was worth US\$1.9 million to the tourism industry over its life span.

Kosrae became the first FSM state to protect sharks, in September 2012. The other states, Yap and Pohnpei, followed suit in 2013.

Micronesia is a region in the western-central Pacific Ocean consisting of the Northern Mariana Islands, FSM, Guam, Kiribati, Nauru, Palau, and the Marshall Islands. At a meeting of the Micronesian Chief Executive Summit in 2011, three presidents and six governors from the region agreed to a Micronesia Regional Shark Sanctuary, an area of protected shark habitat nearly the size of the European Union.

Now nearly every country, state, and territory in the region has established shark protections. The national FSM government is continuing to deliberate on shark legislation. Senator Florencio Singkoro Harper of Chuuk introduced the national legislation in January.

Since 2009, Pew has worked with nine countries to establish shark sanctuaries covering more than 12.6 million square kilometers (4.9 million square miles) of ocean area. Collectively, these sanctuaries equal the size of the United States and Mexico combined.

President Mori's vision realized with new FSM published textbooks

Pohnpei, FSM—The first comprehensive Student Atlas of the Federated States of Micronesia will soon be in use in FSM schools. The editors for the 489 page glossy format text book were Danko Taborosi and Yvonne Neth, both of IREI (Island Research and Education Initiative) but Taborosi says that there were more than a hundred contributors to the beautifully printed book.

The book was the brain child of FSM's President Manny Mori who saw a similar but much less comprehensive and smaller book published by another country while attending one of the Micronesian Leader's Conferences. Upon his return to the FSM, he instructed the Department of Education to develop similar materials in order to boost environmental education in the FSM.

During an interview at the office of The Kaselehlie Press, Wehns Billen of the FSM DOE and Taborosi of IREI both said that the publication of the Student Atlas was a truly collaborative effort between IREI and DOE driven by the President's vision.

The book contains over 1000 illustrations including diagrams, historical pictures, and high quality color photographs and aerial images including satellite views of the islands in the FSM.

The Atlas incorporates more than 100 original maps that were custom created for students with no previous map experience, yet are authoritative and appropriate for general use. The maps were prepared by expert cartographers who contributed to the project. They include portrayals of the key physical and environmental aspects and man-made features of the main islands, as well as a comprehensive coverage of the outer islands, the announcement for the book says.

"This Student Atlas of the Federated States of Micronesia is the indispensable and comprehensive reference to the nation. It is about where we are today, what we have achieved, and where we may be going. Focused on the needs of junior high, high school, and college students and created in response to the National Curriculum Standards and Benchmarks, this atlas is also a general reference that can be read and appreciated by the public and anyone interested in learning about the geography, environment, and people of the FSM," the book announcement says.

Billen said that President Mori also directed DOE to work on the publication of environmental education materials.

Coincident with the publication of the massive Student Atlas of the FSM, DOE in collaboration with IREI published five environmental books geared toward elementary school students. There is one book for each FSM State written in the dominant languages, and one for the FSM Atoll Islands, which, due to the large number of languages spoken in the Atolls is published in English. Each book is specific to the environment and topography of each State and the atolls.

Taborosi said that a Minister of Education in another Micronesian nation once lamented the use of foreign textbooks in the islands. "We are teaching our island children about Maple trees and squirrels," Taborosi quoted him as saying. The publication team decided early on to ensure each and every element of every illustration in all of the books can actually be found in the FSM or in any of the individual FSM States or atolls to which the illustrations apply, right down to the last starfish and shell.

The books will all be put to use in the FSM's public school. Billen said that the Student Atlas is not intended to be a page by page type of text book but as a resource as teachers see fit. 2000 of the expensive print books will be distributed to public schools throughout the FSM based on enrollment numbers. The book contains a very clear release that allows FSM educators to reproduce any of the content for use in the classroom.

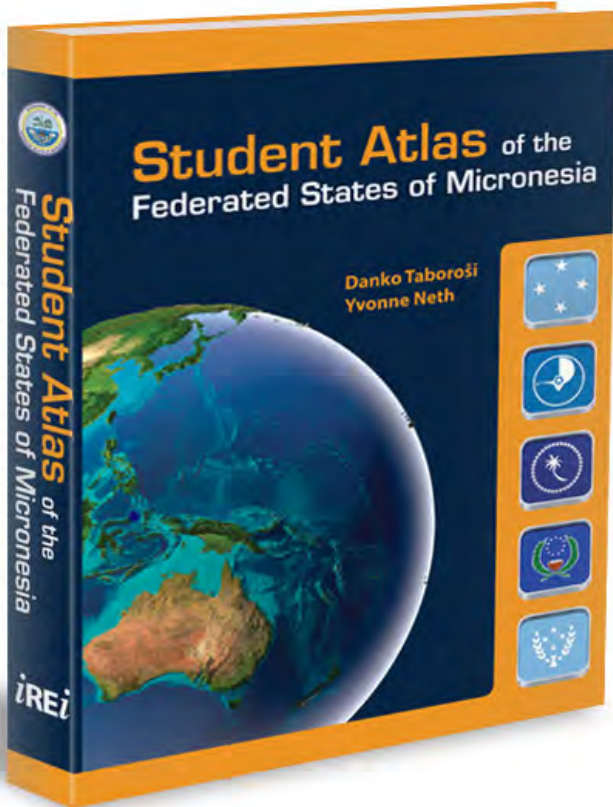
IREI also paid to print an additional 500 copies. In Pohnpei they will be sold at the Joy Hotel though at press time we were unable to find the price for each of the books. The atlas is a beautifully bound but expensive to print book with glossy pages. During our interview Taborosi said that they will likely sell for \$50 to \$70 depending on the quantity ordered.

Taborosi said that publication of the the 489 page Student Atlas of the Federated States of Micronesia took just an astounding two years to reach

the publication stage. He said that many businesses in the FSM supported the work in many ways. He said that several local hotels provided complimentary rooms and meals during the many travels that the team had to undertake while working on material for the books.

Madolenihmw and performed an evaluation of greenfish sea cucumber populations and that they found no evidence of farming. A similar evaluation in 2013 showed a large population of the sea cucumbers. He also said that his office concluded that the sea cucumber population showed signs of being over harvested.

Ringlen says that he doesn't know how OFA performed its evaluation but that the operation is a farming and harvesting operation, and that it is sustainable. He said that the company has 68 employees including the nine employees who process the sea cucumbers by boiling and drying them. All of the employees spend three of their work days harvesting sea cucumbers and two planting them and that the number of sea cucumbers planted is much higher than the number they harvest. When harvesting, the employees have a daily limit of 300 sea cucumbers each during their five hour work day. When planting, each employee plants 1500 sea cucumbers on two days of the week.

Ringlen said that planting began in January and harvesting started in mid-April

Ringlen said that though they do lose some of the sea cucumbers they plant to fish who feed on their intestines, the losses are fairly small because fish do not feed on them after the sea cucumbers close up which he said takes only 45 minutes. Further, he claims that after planting, sea cucumbers grow to harvestable

size in approximately six weeks.

He said that rumors that the company is trying to fill two 40 foot containers with boiled and dried sea cucumbers are untrue. He claims that after harvesting began in mid-April, the project has filled only one small corner of its one 20 foot container. Processed sea cucumbers end up only about three inches long. They look like pickles when dried.

Ringlen denies the rumor that the employees are receiving less than Pohnpei's \$1.75 minimum wage for their work. He said that the planters and harvesters work five hours a day five days a week for which they receive \$50 which is \$2 per hour. He says that employment taxes are being paid.

Ringlen said that Son is operating as a sole proprietor based on his U.S. citizenship.

As to whether or not Son has a required foreign investment permit to operate a business in Pohnpei, Ringlen said he didn't know.

Pohnpei's Office of the Registrar said that US citizens do require a foreign investment permit to operate a business in Pohnpei. They can get a waiver if they have lived in Pohnpei for the five years immediately prior to the filing of an application for a waiver. They said that they had no record of an application for either a foreign investment permit or a waiver in Son's name.

The national government can also issue foreign investment permits but said that a sea cucumber operation would be under the State's jurisdiction.



Ringlen said that he told Son before they started the joint operation that he needed to also get a permit from the Office of Land and Natural Resources for farming sea cucumbers but didn't know whether or not that had ever been done.

The Office of Land and Natural Resources says that they do not remember any application for such a project ever having been filed.

Son is currently in China buying more containers of feed. He said that he brought two containers of feed when the project first began.

"There's a lot of dirty politics and misunderstandings in Pohnpei these days," Ringlen said about the rumors. "People think I'm making money (for myself) but it's not true." He said it's his job under the Madolenihmw Constitution to develop projects to help build the municipality's economy. He's calling it a pilot project and that so far no one has made any money other than the employees through their wages.

Ringlen reiterated that the company and Madolenihmw have a vested interest in running the project in a sustainable way and that is what they are doing.

Kosrae schools prepare for natural disasters!

The month of April was a busy one for Kosrae's elementary schools which participated in the Climate Adaptation, Disaster Risk Reduction, and Education Program (CADRE) being implemented and managed by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) with support from the Australian Government

With partners from the Kosrae Island Resource Management Agency (KIRMA) and Pacific Adaptation to Climate Change (PACC) program, three schools (Lelu, Utwe, and Sansrik) practiced emergency drills for the first time to prepare themselves for natural disasters. The drills were based upon school emergency management plans previously drafted by the school principals with support under the CADRE program.

In addition, 98 eighth grade students from these three schools spent 2 weeks learning about climate change adaptation and disaster preparedness with an IOM trainer and their science teachers. The CADRE

program engages students using a kit of rich learning materials including hazard specific comics, instructional posters, video clips, and hands-on experiments. A student at Sansrik Elementary School commented, "Well, I want to read more comics, so I can pass it on to friends and family. That way we could be safe when there are natural disasters."

IOM has a complete comic and poster set covering: landslides, typhoons, tsunamis, droughts and climate change. These materials have been well received by teachers, as well as students, with a recent survey revealing that over 90% of teachers found the materials very useful and engaging. One teacher exclaimed: "I really like the comic books and even now if students finish early, I have a stack of the comics in the room and they can go read the comics."

Akapito sworn in as Lieutenant Governor of the State of Chuuk

Weno, Chuuk- On Friday, May 2, 2014 in an oath taking ceremony held at the Chuuk State Supreme Court, the Floor Leader in the House of Representative of the Twelfth Chuuk State Legislature, the Honorable Marius Akapito, took his oath of office to become the 7th Lieutenant Governor of Chuuk State, filling the role that was left vacant after the untimely passing of the late Honorable Lieutenant Governor Ritis Heldart on January 4th 2014.

The solemnity of the oath of office to the new Lieutenant Governor of Chuuk was administered by the Chief Justice of the Chuuk State Supreme Court, The Honorable Camilo Noket.

On April 14, The Honorable Governor Johnson S. Elimo transmitted his nomination of Mr. Akapito to the House of Senate pursuant to Article VI, Section 11 of the Chuuk State Constitution, which sets the selection process in an event the office of Lieutenant Governor becomes vacant.

In his nomination letter, Gov. Elimo explained that Mr. Akapito does possess the necessary qualifications for the office of Lieutenant Governor by highlighting the nominee's capacity as a parliamentarian who is familiar with the current issues facing the Sate of Chuuk. Gov. Elimo also pointed out

that his nominee also possesses necessary understanding of the government framework for a constitutional system, such as the system being applied by the Chuuk State Government.

After a thorough review of the nominee's credentials, the full Senate unanimously approved the nomination on the 23rd of April.

In his oath taking remarks on May 2, Lieutenant Governor Marius Akapito said he will assist the Governor to continue the implementation of the infrastructure development plan for Chuuk State and the municipalities. Micro Games 8 CEO gives briefing on games preparation

Pohnpei, FSM—In a little less than two months the 8th Micronesian Games will begin in Pohnpei. With the exception of the soccer field at the National Campus of the College of Micronesia FSM which may not be ready in time it looks like all systems are go. Organizers have a backup plan for the soccer field so even if it's not ready in time the soccer competitions will go on.

As one of the most visible signs of the preparations for the Micro Games, infrastructure is what most people who don't know discuss when talking about whether preparations for the Games will be complete in time.

Games CEO Robert Spegal stopped by to discuss all aspects of the preparation for the Games. He said that so far everything is on track.

About the COM soccer field he said that the field has been leveled and that coral is now being laid. When that is done more dirt will be laid and leveled. When that is completed, grass will be planted. In order for the field to be useful without becoming a quagmire by the middle of the first game on the field the grass will have to grow pretty quickly. The grass needs to have a fully developed root network before the field can be used.

If the COM field is not ready, the backup plan is to use the PICS field where the Pohnpei team currently practices for the 8th Micro Games.

A lot will depend on the weather which is notoriously fickle in Pohnpei. Perhaps it will be more fickle since the Pacific is currently under an El Nino watch. If El Nino does develop, the severity, or arrival time can't yet be predicted. Right now pre El Nino conditions seem to be showing signs of severe El Nino conditions which could arrive in Pohnpei as early as July though that can't be predicted by current weather models.

For the PICS track where track and field events will take place, the Pohnpei Transportation Authority has installed drainage systems and has laid down the necessary asphalt layer for the track itself. Asphalt still needs to be installed for the long and high jump areas but that will soon be done. Containers of rubber material have arrived on island and the materials for the final track layer are scheduled to arrive from Australia during the first week of June at which time installers will make the track happen.

Contracts for the companies that will renovate the COM gym are being finalized. One company will handle the installation of the new floor and another will handle window installations. Materials for those projects have not yet arrived on island.

The Spanish Wall softball field will have a new scoreboard and another layer of dirt and sand mix in the infield to help with drainage. Painting was brilliantly coordinated by the Tuna Commission (WCPFC). The Daini baseball field is getting a little leveling in

the right field corner and will also get infield leveling.

The Pohnpei State Gym where volleyball events will take place is in its final stages of renovation.

The materials for the final surface on the tennis courts have arrived and will be installed sometime this month.

Next door, the swimming pool is ready and an electronic touch timing system has arrived for installation.

The Micro-All-Around will be held at Spanish Wall park and at Nett Point. Both are ready.

Misko Beach will be the spectator area for canoe races. Spegal said that there will be a short course, a long course, and a marathon course which organizers are currently mapping out.

Under the leadership of the accommodation and transportation committee, beautification and rehabilitation of the classrooms and dorms at PICS High School that will serve as the Micro Games Village is underway. Spegal said that it anticipates that 1200 athletes from all of the jurisdiction except for Guam will stay at the Games village at PICS. Guam's athletes will stay at various hotels.

Spegal says that all 10 jurisdictions have said they will send athletes to the Games. The jurisdictions are each of the FSM States, Kiribas, Nauru, the Marshall Islands, Palau, Guam, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands. Spegal estimates that including the athletes, coaches, managers, and officials, 1700-1800 people will be on Pohnpei for the Games, not counting spectators who choose to come.

The accreditation committee has set up a website (www.foxsportspulse.com) that allows for online registration of athletes and others including media participants.

Spegal said that the fund raising committee is still sending out letters requesting funding assistance and that there have been many positive responses. The committee has pending supplemental budget requests with the Pohnpei State Legislature and the FSM Congress. They have urged the two bodies to act on those requests as soon as possible because the money is needed now.

The catering committee has ordered food supplies which will arrive in time for the Games including 13,400 pounds of rice and 770 pounds of pork chops as just a small sample of the orders they have made.

The media and broadcasting committee is establishing a media center at PICS for worldwide transmission of the Games and their results. Several media representatives have said they will send crews including Oceania Television from Palau, the Pacific Daily News, and a few freelancers. He expects that many more will come.

Plans have been set up to have a medical response team at each sporting event. Spegal said that he hopes that the US military will respond positively to their request to have medical assistance from the US Armed Forces as well.

He said that the Secretariat of the Pacific Community and Pohnpei Health Services will be conducting what it is calling a health surveillance exercise. For now it's an exercise, but if a contagious disease of any kind should "pop up" during the event they will be prepared to deal with it.

The souvenir committee has been collecting good luck messages from heads of states of each of the jurisdictions and is trying to collect team photographs of each of the teams that will participate in the Games. They will use that material along with other materials to create a Games program. Pages in the program are available for sale. Anyone who wants to help with the production of the program can contact Stephanie Edward at 8mgbooklet@gmail.com.

The protocol committee has been planning an excellent ceremony that will include a huge flag, a skydiver, and other details that are currently secret. They will arrange to meet people at the airport and on their way down the causeway, athletes and others will be greeted by welcoming signs in the main languages of the ten jurisdictions.

They are in the process of planning for all of the many awards ceremonies. The FSMNOC has ordered approximately 1500 awards medals for the winners of the various competitions.

The security committee has been making sure that police are ready for the event and have been recruiting security personnel.

Spegal said that many of the sports competition materials have arrived such as baseballs, softballs, chalk, chalk liners, and many other items. More are on their way.

Spegal said that if anyone in the vicinity has living space in the vicinity of Kolonia they can call the Games phone number at 320-3266.

Each of the committees has been recruiting their own volunteers but if others want to be involved as a volunteer they can likewise call the Games number 320-3266.

There is still much to be done but preparations for the Games seem to be well in hand.

Sports update – 2014 Micronesian Games – Track and field and swimming

For the next few issues of KPress, we will be updating the status of the sports to be played at the 2014 Micro Games. This article will update Athletics (Track and Field) and Swimming.

The 8th Micronesian Games will be held on Pohnpei from July 20 – 30, 2014. Participating in the games is CNMI (Northern Marianas), Guam, Kiribati, Marshall Islands, Nauru, Palau and the four Federated States of Micronesia states (Pohnpei, Kosrae, Chuuk and Yap). There will be 14 sports on the games program including Athletics (Track and Field), Baseball, Basketball, Football (Soccer), Micronesian All-Around, Softball (Fast-Pitch), Spear Fishing, Swimming, Table Tennis, Tennis, Va'a (6-man outrigger canoe), Volleyball, Weightlifting and Wrestling.

The 8th Micronesian Games Organizing Committee is chaired by Pohnpei Lt. Governor Marcelo K. Peterson. The CEO of the organizing committee is Bob Spegal. There are 11 sub-committees including the Sport Committee. The Sport Committee is chaired by Jim Tobin, with an estimated 500 volunteers and officials. There are 14 Competition Managers for each of the 14 sports on the game's sports program:

The Competition Managers are in charge of coordinating each sport including: sports manuals and rules; technical meetings; final schedules; recruiting volunteers; training sport specific officials; and preparing the sport venue each day of the competition.

To assist the Competition Managers, we have been recruiting professional Technical Delegates, nominated by the international and Oceania governing bodies of each of the sports, to come to Pohnpei to train our local volunteers and officials and work with the competition manager to coordinate and supervise each of the sports at games time.

Micronesian All-Around and Spear Fishing do not have international or Oceania sport governing bodies. Thus, there will be no outside technical delegate for those two sport and all technical issues will be decided by the local Competition Manager. The Technical Delegates will be arriving to Pohnpei at least one week prior to the start of their sport, and will hold week long officials and coaches courses. The courses will not just be for the Pohnpei officials and coaches but for all of the FSM states, including Kosrae, Chuuk and Yap. With United Airlines having issues with limited planes, rumor has it that the other FSM states must come to Pohnpei at least one week before the opening of the games on Sunday, July 20.

All of the Technical Delegates (and other outside Technical officials) costs, including airfare, hotel, stipend and local transport are funded by grants from the FSM National Olympic Committee (FSMNOC), Oceania National Olympic Committees (ONOC), International Olympic Committee (IOC), United States Olympic Committee (USOC), Palau National Olympic Committee (PNOC), Guam National Olympic Committee (GNOC), International Athletics Federation (IAAF), International Basketball Federation (FIBA), International Swimming Federation (FINA), International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF), International Wrestling Federation (FILA) and International Wrestling Federation (IWF). Our grants also include the majority of the sport equipment needed to run the games. The estimated amount of the outside officials' expenses and donated sport equipment is over \$400,000. After the games are over, the equipment will be shared by all of the 4 FSM states.

ATHLETICS (Track and Field)
 The Athletics competition will be held from Monday, July 21 to Thursday, July 24 at the newly renovated PICS track and field. The Competition Manager for Athletics is Rendy Germinaro. On Monday, July 14, Yvonne Mullens, Executive Director of Oceania Athletics Association (OAA), will arrive to Pohnpei. Starting on Tuesday, July 15 a 4-day IAAF basic track and field officials and coaches training course, with Mullens as the expert instructor, will be held. There will be 6 additional OAA and IAAF technical officials from New Zealand and Australia coming to Pohnpei on July 18, including 2 electronic photo-finish technicians, 2 starters, 1 field referee and 1 call room coordinator.

The renovation of the PICS track and field should be completed by the end of June, funded by the Pohnpei State Government and Pohnpei State Legislature. A \$30,000 special track and field equipment grant was approved last year by the IAAF to fund new starting blocks, hurdles, throwing implements, electronic starting pistol, hurdle carts, batons, stop watches and other track and field equipments. That container of donated equipment will be arriving on Pohnpei from Brisbane the second week of June.

SWIMMING

The Swimming competition will be held from Monday, July 21 to Wednesday, July 23 at the newly renovated FSMNOC Swimming Pool Complex, located next to PICS High School. Governor signs proclamation for National Women's Health Week in Yap

COLONIA, Yap (Media Division) — The Honorable Sebastian Anefal, Governor of the State of Yap on Wednesday, May 7, 2014 affixed his signature to a Proclamation Recognizing "National Women's Health Week" from May 12-16, 2014, in the State of Yap.

Proclamation No. 2014-01, which was issued by the Office of the Governor states:

Whereas, Women's Health Week is an international week-long observance of efforts to promote women's health;

Whereas, the Yap State Department of Health Services has and is continuing to diagnose new cancer cases each year in Yap;

Whereas, in calendar year 2013, there were 19 new cancer diagnoses in Yap;

Whereas, out of the 19 new cancer cases diagnosed, 9 were women among which 2 have Mouth cancer, 2 Lung cancer, 1 Rectal cancer, 1 Skin cancer, 1 Brain cancer, 1 Conjunctiva cancer and 1 Lymph Node cancer;

Whereas, the average cost of sending a cancer patient off island for medical treatment has gone up from around \$11,000 to \$15,000 per patient in the last five years and the number of cancer patients being sent off island per year has doubled in the last five years;

Whereas, science and research have shown the practicing health lifestyle behaviors, such as eating local food – particularly fruits and vegetables – daily, regular exercise and physical activity, watching your weight, not drinking alcohol, not using tobacco products, not chewing betel nut, and abstaining from sex with multiple partners are all factors that can contribute to lowering one's risk of developing cancer;

Whereas, increasing immunization coverage rate for Hepatitis B vaccines to newborns will help prevent the spread of the Hepatitis B virus which is associated with increased risk for liver cancer;

Whereas, increasing immunization coverage for the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) vaccine to young girls between the ages of 9 and 18

years will help prevent the spread of four deadly strains of the HPV virus which are responsible for 70% of cervical cancers and 90% of genital warts;

Whereas, the prevalence and incidence of diabetes and hypertension are increasing at an alarming rate in our State, especially among the younger generation;

Whereas, women should get at least 2 hours and 30 minutes of moderate physical activity, or 1 hour and 15 minutes of vigorous physical activity each day of the week;

Whereas, Mothers' Day falls on the second Sunday in May of each year and is an appropriate time to actively promote the health of all women through screening which is a preventive tool to assess the health status of individuals at a point in time;

Now therefore, by the power vested in me as Governor, I hereby proclaim that Yap State shall observe National Women's Health Week from May 12-16, 2014;

Further, I Resolve that the Department of Health Services, including the Wa'ab Community Health Centers, with the support of other relevant agencies of government as necessary, shall work to create awareness on health issues affecting Yap State and encourage all citizens, to be more physically active in their everyday life and to promote planting, harvesting, and consumption of all local foods, fruits, and vegetables as the way to healthier living and to reduce the burden of cancer and other non-communicable diseases on families and the State.

All female government employees are strongly encouraged to avail themselves of the free health screenings offered during this time. All government departments and agency heads are hereby directed to grant administrative leave to their female staff, where requested, so that they may avail themselves of the free health screening which will be offered at the hospital and all the Wa'ab Community Health Center sites in Tomil, Gagil, Maap/Rumung and Nimgil starting at 9am every day. President Mori asks Congress to carefully examine the proposed “2023 Investment Fund”, other priorities highlighted to “Committee to Wait”

Two days after the opening of the Fourth Regular Session of the 18th Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia, the Congressional Special Committee (Committee to Wait of the President) met with President Manny Mori this morning at the President's Conference Room.

The Committee consisted of Senator Joseph J. Urusemal, Senator Yosiwo P. George and Senator David W. Panuelo, who said he was a last minute appointment. Senator Panuelo, who chaired the Committee, took the place of Senator Peter M. Christian. Senator Wesley W. Simina, also appointed to the Committee, did not attend the meeting.

President Mori welcomed the Committee and assured the Members that the Executive Branch is ready to work with Congress to achieve a productive session. He asked that Congress expedite action on the FY15 recommended budget during this session and not delay budget review portions to the September session, as previously happened for FY13 and FY14 budget review processes.

President Mori specifically asked that Congress evaluate carefully the proposed 2023 Investment Fund as included in the FY15 budget request submitted last month. The President is proposing a \$15 million set aside into the fund out of local revenue to assist with economic development projects that must undergo "due diligence" process. He informed the Committee that a framework for the mechanics of the investment fund, which is tasked to the Office of SBOC and the Chief of Staff, will be provided to Congress once completed. The President said that about \$10 million to \$15 million should be invested in the fund every year leading to 2023 to demonstrate seriousness in facilitated economic growth and build investors' confidence in investing in the FSM economy.

The President also pointed to the requested \$5 million, also from local revenue, to go toward the FSM Trust Fund.

President Mori also indicated that inclusive in the FY15 budget request is a \$1.4 million Congressional public project allocation. The President feels that the inclusion of such allocation in the budget request will give Members time to involve stakeholders and conduct more careful planning for specific economic and social development projects, as compared to previous practices.

Among other items discussed, President Mori also asked Congress to consider his request to give a State of the Nation Address to Congress, and the Nation, preferably on May 27. He also informed the Committee that the State and National Leadership Conference has been scheduled for May 22nd and 23rd, for which he looks forward to Congress' vital participation.

Chairman Panuelo thanked the President and Vice President for the opportunity to discuss priorities for the ensuing session. Together, the Senators sought clarifications on a number of issues including World Bank grants for FSM, updates on the status of the newly endorsed Overseas Development Assistance Policy, and whether or not Congress should expect a revised budget request as a result of the "zeroing out" of National Government's share of Compact Sector grants, which happened after the FY15 budget had been transmitted to Congress.

The Committee also brought to attention a concern raised by certain Members involving the slow processing of public project funds that, they alleged, have caused project delays and changes.

The Senators also expressed concern that required reporting by funds allottees has not been upheld.

The President instructed the Secretary of Finance to look into the matter and provide fund status and expenditure reports to allottees to be in compliance with required reporting to Congress.

Finally, the Leaders took some time to discuss the current passport printing hold-up

situation. The Secretary of Justice reported that the Department will receive passport booklet supplies by tomorrow and that around seven thousand booklets will be available by next week. She said the office is positioned to work on the back-log of passport requests the next five days and maintain operation thereafter.

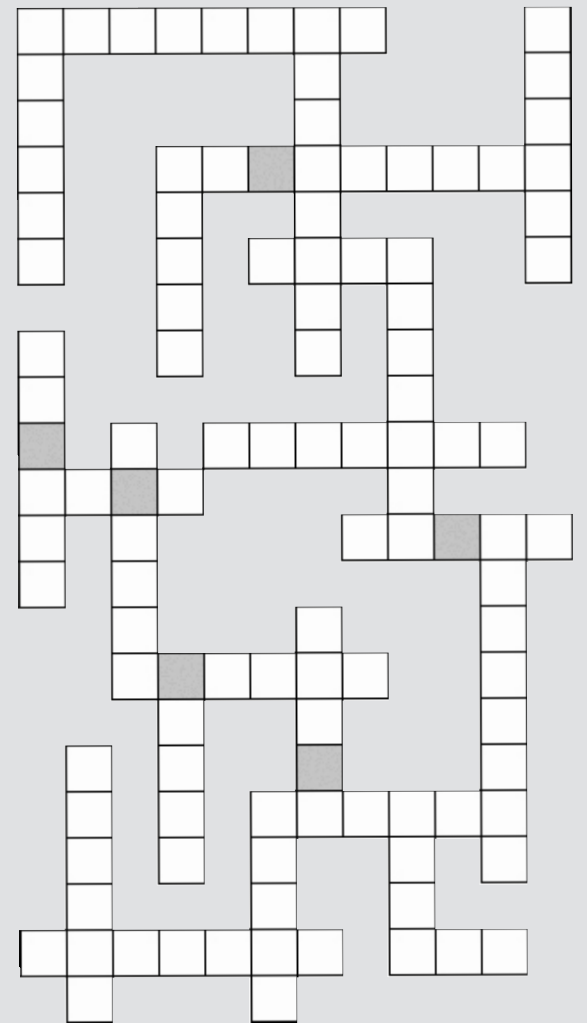

U.S. Approves \$3.96 Million use of prior year Carry-Over Sector Grant Funds

In April, the Office of Insular Affairs released awards granted at the Mid-year JEMCO meeting for use of prior year "Carry-Over" funds. The "Carry-Over" funds are designated to be used for one-time projects that will result in operational savings, support reform processes within the government, mitigate the effects of the fiscal reforms, or have a direct positive impact upon performance indicators. Almost \$1.5 Million was awarded for Education Projects, which include such projects as climate proofing schools, increasing student attendance, providing necessary equipment for after-school programs, and technical assistance in school accreditation. Infrastructure awards of approximately \$2 Million will be used to enable power companies to provide sustainable, consistent service. Almost \$275,000 was awarded in the Health Sector for projects such as infant care, technical assistance for non-communicable disease interventions, and emergency response. Capacity Building awards of almost \$125,000 will be used for Government financial reforms and upgrades, and improved tax collection systems.

Boy Scout donates 72-hour kits to missionaries

Barrigada, Guam-Thoughts of the recent disasters in the Philippines and other parts of the world left such an impression on 13 year old Cooper Jack Tuttle that it inspired him to create an Eagle Scout project to provide missionaries of his church with a 72-hour emergency kit. These kits include necessities to sustain life for a 72-hour period which is the approximate time necessary for help and assistance to arrive after a disaster. There are approximately 110 volunteer missionaries of the LDS Church serving in Guam, CNMI, Palau, and the FSM. These kits will ensure that the missionaries are prepared in case of a natural disaster which is exactly what the Boy Scout motto, "Be Prepared", urges every scout to do.
