

Members of US Congress warn FSM of Compact implementation problems

A letter dated July 22, 2008 and signed by ten influential members of the United States Congress warned of their perception of the problems with the FSM's implementation of Compact II. The letter was addressed to FSM's President Emanuel Mori and the Honorable Isaac V. Figir, Speaker of the Congress of the FSM. It was copied to the four State Governors.

The Compact of Free Association between the Federated States of Micronesia and The United States of America provides for reciprocal benefits between the nations. The United States initially supplied \$76.2 million dollars to fund six sectors (Health, Education, Infrastructure, Public Sector Capacity Building, Environment, and Private Sector Development) and \$16 million was deposited into a trust fund. The funding



level provided by the United States for the FSM stayed at that level for the first three years of Compact II. Beginning with the fourth year sector funding was decreased by \$800,000 and US contributions to the Trust Fund was increased. Direct funding decreases of \$800,000 and Trust Fund

World Fuel Prices Drop, PetroCorp Follows Suit



By Bill Jaynes PetroCorp, when it The Kaselehlie Press took control of the assets of Mobil Oil of Micronesia, Incorporated (MOMI) on June 30 also assumed control of the fuel still stored in the tanks at the Dekehtik tank farm in Pohnpei. The new corporation received its first shipment of fuel from Mobil on August 2 to replenish that supply.

On August 11, PetroCorp revised its price list for the fuel products that they sell. All of the prices were lower.

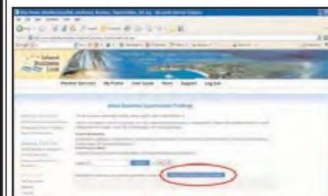
By the end of the day on August 12 prices at the pump reflected some of that price

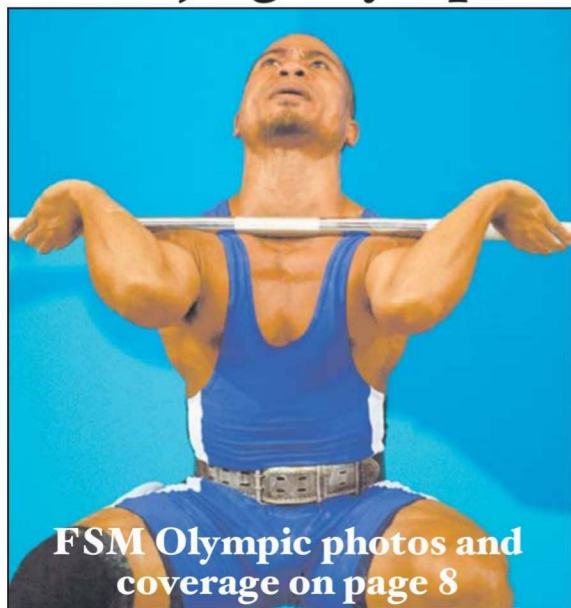

OIA suspends Compact funding for three sectors in Chuuk

In a letter dated August 1 of this year, Tom Bussanich, Director of the Division of Budget and Grants Management for the US Office of Insular Affairs (OIA) notified Fabian Nimea, Director of FSM's Office of Statistics, Budget, and Overseas Coordination (SBOC) that Compact funds for Chuuk State would be withheld beginning August 4. The three sectors affected by the notice are Private Sector Development, Environment, and Public Sector Capacity building.

The Health and Education sectors are not affected by OIA's action. Bussanich outlined a process for exemption from the suspension when funds from the Public Sector Capacity Building sector grant are required to support those two sectors.

According to the letter, the widely publicized July 11, 2008 termination of Gillian Doone as Chuuk's Director of the Department of Administrative Services by Governor Wesley Simina prompted OIA's action. The

Three Pohnpei school buildings nearly ready for contractor bids

Nearly five years after the start of Compact II, the agreement between the United States and the Federated States of Micronesia that includes a significant amount of money for infrastructure for the FSM, the bidding process for the construction of three school building in the FSM is set to begin. Robert Westerfield who is coordinating the efforts of the FSM's Project Management Unit (PMU) said that bids would be solicited beginning in about three weeks.

Lyon's Associates is a fairly recent entry into the process put into place to get help get infrastructure projects done. They have a multi-year contract administered by the PMU with the FSM National Government to provide planning and design services for Compact funded infrastructure projects.

Pat Campanella, Vice President of Lyon Associates, Inc. said that the primary emphasis at this time is education, health, water, wastewater and electricity. He said that they got the contract when they responded to a publicly advertised Request for Proposal. His firm was the most highly rated firm of the four selected.

Campanella said that Lyon has two specific projects under contract: Three class-

room buildings in Pohnpei and the Weno Road-Phase I project in Chuuk. He said that it is important to note that Lyon is not permitted to be involved with the selection of General Contractors except where they are asked to answer design related questions during bidding.

He said that in addition to negotiating fees they are obligated to submit a schedule for their work that indicates milestones. Those milestones are called deliverables. For the schools, Lyon will be delivering a pre-final design in August.

The CAD-CAM rendering of a Pohnpei School building is for a building that is intended to be "site adaptable" meaning that the same design can be constructed in different locations with relatively minor modifications. The design is in its "pre-final" stages. Campanella said that Lyon is designing a roof mounted solar (photo-voltaic) powered system to make electricity for lighting and ventilation.



Campanella said that the FSM-PMU set the administrative and technical guidelines for their contract and work. "Generally speaking we are following a long-standing model applied by the United States Government for federally funded projects. This approach makes sense and is working well thus far. The goal is to develop a quality product, deliver it on time, complete in nature and cost effective. The best value is not always the least expensive solution. For example: more expensive materials may require higher initial cost, but will typically require less maintenance and repair. We are obligated to make this analysis during the concept design stage of each project."

He said that the FSM states are obligated by FSM-PMU and the Compact II agreement to submit programming documents for projects in a specific form. The documents "are simple and straight forward." The main elements are history, justification, cost, schedule, and environment. "For whatever reasons, these programming documents have not been forthcoming from the States to the FSM -PMU, until recently. That is why from the inception of the second Compact significantly less funding than anticipated has been approved by DOI-OIA."

Despite the "simple and straight forward nature" of the documents that are necessary to get a project approved, Campanella said that it was important for the State to retain the technical expertise to prepare the programming documents for submission to the FSM-PMU. He said, "If properly prepared and focused it is almost certain that the requests for project funding will be approved."

FSM-PMU's Westerfield said that he didn't want to be too specific in giving and estimated cost for the three school buildings because he didn't want to influence

the bidding process. He said that the combined cost might be in the neighborhood of less than \$3 million. Competitive bidding might cause the price to be lower.

Westerfield, when asked if local contractors were prohibited from bidding on the project as we had been told said, "No, we're not saying that local contractors cannot bid."

There are a number of problems that might work to keep a local contractor from qualifying under bidding requirements. Contractors must be bonded. Construction bonding, insurance that guarantees that the job will be completed satisfactorily, on time, and within bid limits is very difficult for contractors in the FSM to get. Many do not have a history that would show a bonding agent that they can successfully complete a big job. Bonding agents also want US law to rule where their bonds might require court action. Westerfield said that this factor means that a local contractor would probably have to have an associate office in Guam or another place where US law prevails.

A further problem for local contractors is the cash resources required in order for contractors to purchase materials at the price they used to submit their bid. Prices for construction materials fluctuate, sometimes wildly and there is no guarantee that prices used to make a bid will still be the same when the contractor is ready to buy those materials for the job unless the contractor locks in a price by obligating the purchases in advance. Few contractors in the FSM have the cash resources to guarantee their bid.

Campanella said, "For the projects we are working on, the interest and support of local government, end users, interested citizens, FSM-PMU and DOI-OIA has been tremendously positive."

LELU, Kosrae – FSM President Manny Mori, Kosrae Governor Robert Weilbacher, Pohnpei Governor John Ehsa, Yap Governor Sebastian Anefal and Chuuk Lt. Governor Elimo Johnson concluded the most recent FSM Chief Executive Council meeting with a clear vision toward heading off the massive challenges the nation faces.

Those challenges include an expanding energy crisis and increase in the overall cost of living brought about by the exorbitant cost of global oil. Indeed, much of the focus of the Chief Executive Council (CEC) discussions focused on the quickly expanding energy and food costs the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) and the rest of the North Pacific region is facing.

Other topics at the CEC included joint FSM-United States Compact budget consultations for fiscal year 2009, Infrastructure sector projects in the nation, the 5th-year US-FSM Compact II review, climate change, the FSM submarine fiber optic cable project and a vocational training center to be established in Pohnpei, FSM in response to the US military build up in Guam.

The Kosrae CEC was the third such meeting of the President and the FSM Governors in 2008, having previously met in Pohnpei (January) and Yap (April).

FSM Leaders Move on Energy and Food Challenges

Chief Executive Council meeting in Kosrae strengthens resolve toward mitigating spiraling inflation

President Emanuel Mori and the Governors have been consistent and more unified as the year has progressed in their collective effort to address the major issues facing the FSM.

Governor Weilbacher of Kosrae led the meeting with a statement that all the principals come to a collective understanding on decisions that would help the FSM "along in its development process." Governor Ehsa of Pohnpei brought greetings from the traditional chiefs of his state and stated that "a very frank discussion" was necessary to overcome the major challenges of the day. Ehsa emphasized a need to focus on the nation's infrastructure development prerogatives.

President Mori set the tone early on fuel and energy, stating that it is one of the most critical issues for the FSM and that "concrete action" would be required. Mori also highlighted the rising cost of both food and fuel, and called for the state governments to follow the lead of the

National Government in using surpluses to increase salaries throughout the nation in order to stimulate the economy and offset continuing inflationary trends.

Lt. Governor Elimo Johnson of Chuuk, representing Governor Wesley Simina, noted the seriousness of the issues for the nation, and particularly for Chuuk, which continues to struggle under government reforms and infrastructure development delays.

Governor Anefal of Yap highlighted points on energy and the high cost of imported food, and the reality that the prices for both have "gone beyond the reach of many people."

Anefal and the other leaders continued to discuss climate change, a permanent CEC issue moving forward. The FSM will host its first annual Climate Change Summit in September as part of a more coordinated response on the front line of this global crisis.

FSM Congressmen Paliknoa Welley of Kosrae and Moses Nelson of Chuuk were

present on behalf of the Legislative branch.

The outcome of the meeting was a joint communiqué and the passage of five resolutions. The resolutions called for a more efficient mobilization of infrastructure fund and projects in the FSM, compliance in the usage of Compact carry over funds, official recognition and support of the Association of Micronesian Utilities (AMU) and the designation of State energy policy workgroups, the need to develop a national climate change policy closely aligned to the nation's ongoing energy policy development and to move ahead immediately in working with the US to mobilize funds and implement the submarine fiber optic cable project.

The fiber optic project is seen as a major infrastructure initiative that will spur development in the health and education sectors in particular and connect the FSM states to each other and the world through faster internet speeds and transfer of greater amounts of information and technology.

The Office of SBOC once again acted as secretariat and principal facilitator of the event, working closely with its branch office in Kosrae and the Kosrae Office of Planning and Budget.

The next CEC is tentatively scheduled to be held in Chuuk, in the month of October.

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letter said that since the termination of Doone the Office of Insular Affairs (OIA) has not received a plan from either the Chuuk State Government or the FSM National Government on how proper financial and management oversight will be restored.

President Mori's Chief of Staff, Kasio E. Mida said that it wasn't the firing of Doone in particular that caused the suspension but the lack of another qualified individual ready to take the position and a plan for proper financial and management oversight in Chuuk.

The Joint Economic Management Council (JEMCO), after its August 2007 meeting informed the FSM that JEMCO required the replacement of the "failed management regime in Chuuk". That action was taken "to ensure that the Compact program was not undermined by continued financial irresponsibility illustrated by the general fund deficit, un-auditable conditions, and unsustainable management practices. The adoption of the JEMCO measure was passed unanimously during the 2007 meeting.

Chuuk's Compact Fund Control Commission (CFCC) received a copy Bussanich's letter instructing them to "immediately suspend processing of payments for Compact-related obligations or expenditures incurred in these three sectors after August 4, 2008."

The letter also requested that the CFCC not release additional payments under the reduction-in-force (RIF) grant, "as it appears that Chuuk State government is no longer in compliance with the terms of the grant supporting financial reforms."

OIA's instructions did allow for exemptions in the expenditure of the Public Sector Capacity Building sector grant funds where those funds are necessary to provide critical financial and other support to the health and education sectors. Those exemptions can be made according to the provisions of the letter by the FSM Secretary of Finance and Administration with notification provided to both OIA and CFCC.

Bussanich said that the suspension of funding under the three sectors would be reconsidered if OIA receives a credible plan from the FSM National Government and after the installation of a properly functioning financial management regime within Chuuk State Government. Key personnel in any plan submitted would be subject to OIA concurrence.

According to an FSM press release, President Mori who has been heading the FSM's delegation to the Olympic Games in Beijing has decided to cut his trip short in order to meet with Chuuk's leadership. "President Mori intends to impress upon the leadership the urgency to take full charge of ensuring that all compact requirements and needed reforms agreed between Chuuk State and the National Government are strictly adhered to."

FSM Government to host 19th SPREP Annual Meeting

SPREP consists of 25 members: twenty-one Pacific island countries and territories and four developed countries with direct interests in the region.

The FSM became a member of SPREP in December 1994 and since then, has enjoyed a productive and prosperous working relation with SPREP. This will be the first time the FSM will host an Annual Meeting of the Secretariat of the Pacific Regional Environment Program. At least, 200 participants are expected to come to Pohnpei to attend this historic meeting including Mr. Yvo de Boer, the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) Executive Director. This will be a rare and special visit by the world's top climate change official, and the FSM is very much honored and appreciative of his presence to attend the 19th Annual Meeting of SPREP.

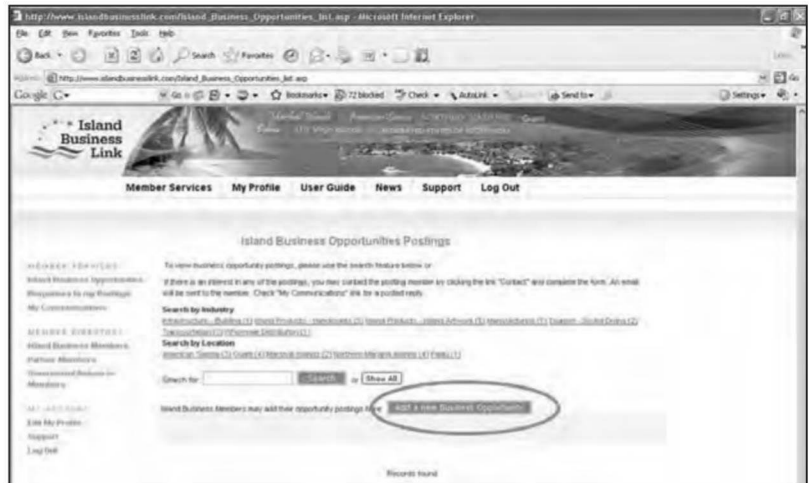

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the FSM Executive Branch is then submitted to the US Congress for their review. Adjustments in the terms of the Compact can be made by that branch after consideration and deliberations.

Epel Ilon, FSM's Assistant Director of the Division of Compact Management said that the Five Year review is not a renegotiation but that changes could be made by Congress based on the report of the US Executive Branch and the comments on the report of the FSM Executive Branch. He said that some changes have already been implemented in the Compact since its inception nearly five years ago. As an example he pointed to a change that now makes it possible for FSM citizens to access free legal services in the US if they qualify financially. He also said that FSM citizens living in Palau are now eligible for Pell Grants at Palau Community College where they were not before.

The letter from the US Congress to the leaders of the FSM was faxed to the President's office and to the FSM Congress Speaker's office. Before the day was over a typed version of the letter had been posted anonymously on the Micronesian Seminar Forum. The original letter had not yet arrived in the FSM through the usual formal diplomatic channels by the time a scanned version of the letter was posted on the Internet also by an unknown person.

to MOMI until it was sold to a customer.

If the world price for crude oil increased while the fuel from a previous shipment was still in the tanks, the owner of the fuel could and, according to the source at PetroCorp who asked to remain anonymous, often did raise the price when the world price increased.

Competition might have decreased the value of the fuel in the tanks when world market prices went down but competition for fuel sales did not, and still does not exist in any of the FSM states.

It does exist in Guam. Pump prices there have decreased at least twice within the last month according to news articles from the area.

The recently published price list approved by Peter Christian, Chairman of the FSM Petroleum Corporation does not include the price that PetroCorp paid for their last shipment of fuel. It also does not include other associated overhead costs for the corporation.

The approved price list says that the prices will be in effect for one month.

U.S. delivers \$3 million infrastructure maintenance grant to the FSM

Embassy of the United States of America

The United States Government has awarded an innovative Public Infrastructure Sector Grant of US \$3 million to the FSM to be administered by Chuuk, Kosrae, Pohnpei and Yap State Governments in the amount of \$750,000 for each state. This grant funding may only be used for projects directly related to the:

- Construction, repair, renovation, or rehabilitation of education and health facilities;
- Provision of potable water to education and health facilities; and
- Public safety

At a special ceremony in the FSM President's Conference Room on August 8, Secretary of Foreign Affairs Lorin Robert confirmed acceptance of this grant award. Under the terms of the grant, within 30 days each state government must provide a prioritized list that describes their proposed projects. The FSM National and State Governments worked together in close partnership with the United States Embassy and the U.S. Department of the Interior to propose and secure Compact funding for this purpose.

Secretary Robert praised "the spirit of partner-

ship embodied in the mere availability of this funding." He described this type of aid delivery as "a positive indication that the implementation of the Amended Compact can be flexible in addressing the special needs and circumstances of the FSM States." He concluded, "I believe there will be times and situations that will compel both sides to be creative and innovative in pursuing our mutual goals while maintaining the spirit, objective and dignity of the Compact."

Vice President Alik, joined by other members of the FSM Cabinet, Governor Ehsa and his Chief of Staff, offered a champagne toast to the spirit of partnership embodied in the new aid delivery mechanism.

Full Text of Ambassador Hughes' Speech

The grant that our two governments have authorized today opens a small but significant window in our efforts to direct aid flexibly and responsibly at the grass roots level. The United States Government has made a special effort to innovate, with Compact money, a more effective delivery system.

On this proud occasion, I appreciate the opportunity to say it clearly and publicly: We need to target our aid in a fruitful way

and make sure it is not wasted. We want our assistance to prepare the good people of the Federated States of Micronesia for all challenges. We aim to empower Micronesian officials to fulfill with pride the most basic obligation of governance - to anticipate, define and fulfill the needs of your citizens. Secretary of the Interior Dirk Kempthorne telephoned President Mori last May to offer this grant as an enabling mechanism, particularly at the state level.

The terms of the grant provide each state up to \$750,000 in order to: construct, repair and renovate education and health facilities; provide potable water to these facilities; and to improve public safety. We encourage the states to use local contractors and employ local labor for these relatively small-scale projects. Starting today, with acceptance of the grant by the FSM National Government, a 30 day clock has begun to tick. No matching funds are required. Within 30 days, every state must provide, in priority order, a list and description of its proposed projects. In fact, the states are ahead of the game; they all have their lists ready.

This is an example of how Micronesians can take ownership of their own priorities.

The states and municipalities are excited. They plan to use this money to repair toilets at schools, repaint classrooms, maybe purchase a fire truck, and patch leaking roofs, build shelves and hang doors at dispensaries and educational facilities. We look forward to seeing all the proposals, as well as the consequent results of your labor in the field. Timely attention to repairs will save money over the long run and enhance the dignity of your people, laying a foundation for future generations.

We hope this is just the beginning of a streamlined approach to development. In terms of a larger paradigm shift, we expect that you will also consider rightsizing, mobilizing civic participation, and establishing dynamic frameworks for private businesses that generate economic growth. You may need to make your own adjustments and to experiment with new models on your own terms, just as this grant is intended to do. But I want to reassure you, that the American Government is prepared to think beyond standardized approaches, if necessary, in order to maximize our aid effectiveness and to help you meet the needs of your people.

We need to hear from you. Now the clock is ticking.

President Mori Meets FSM Olympic Team in Beijing

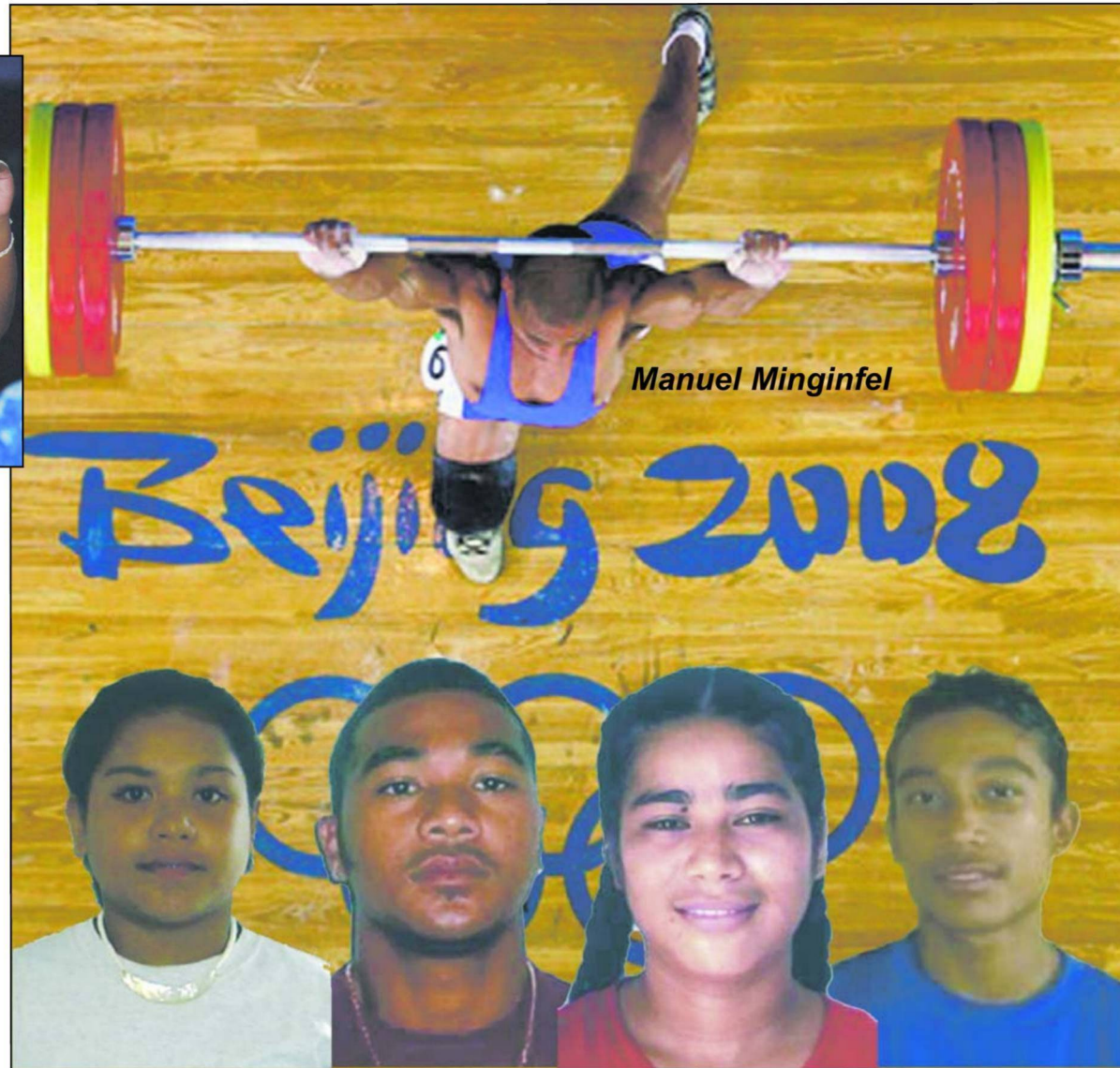

The time was a season best for Ikelap.

Jack Howard said that he found it hard to focus on his form. He finished outside of his personal best at 11.03 in his race.

FSM swimmers each delivered personal best times in their races. Kerson Hadley swam the 50 meter freestyle in 25.34 breaking his

Minginfel said that this will be his last competition. He is retiring from competition and hopes to teach children.

It's 9:00 in the evening on Saturday, August 16 at The Kaselehlie Press and I'm excited!

Its eight days into the sixteen days scheduled for the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing. This morning at 10:00 (1:00 PM Pohnpei time) Maria Ikelap ran the 100 meter dash. She was the last of the five people who competed for the Federated States of Micronesia.

I keep hitting the send receive button on my email program waiting for the last of the FSM results but they're not here. I've searched online for FSM Olympic results without much luck. It's not the first time I've searched. One of my Internet forays lasted over four hours. I'm starting to think that the odds of finding FSM Olympic results online would be similar to the odds of a first time treasure hunter finding the treasure that, according to legend is supposed to be hidden somewhere in Kosrae.

In many ways the process of looking online for FSM results from the Olympic Games has been enlightening.

I immediately discovered that the US media doesn't seem to care about islanders in the Games. One of the US media websites I checked for photos had multiple listings for Afghanistan, Azerbaijan, Bahrain, Iran, Jamaica (yep, an island), Mexico, Pakistan, the Philippines (another island with a huge

population), and of course the United States. There were well over a hundred photos of Kirsty Coventry of Zimbabwe on that website.

The Compact II with its built-in annual decrement (was) intended to be supplemented by revenues generated from the business sector during the balance of its 20 year(s), which would end in 2023.

"Reports from the United States clearly indicated that since the beginning of Compact II until today there was no significant growth in the private sector. As time is getting shorter under Compact II and because of (the) lack of clear direction

Seen Any Good Movies Lately?

There is a definite feeling of elation in the air; adrenaline is pumping, and nationalism is at an all-time high. It could be that someone is slipping dopamine into the water supply or that maybe the President has been looking especially handsome and smart lately. However, I have a pretty good feeling this aura of excitement has something to do with the events unfolding in a very special bird's nest in the city of Beijing.

If half the world is not sitting in that impossibly large stadium, the other half is living vicariously through their television sets, mouths agape, at the edge of their seats, watching the world's best as they compete for the gold.

If you were hoping to escape the heart-pumping thrill of watching athletes set new world records by heading to the theater for some solace and peace, I'm absolutely delighted to inform you that you'd be dead wrong.

The Dark Knight (2008)

Gotham's vigilante superhero is back and not only does he have a new ride, a new suit, and a new pad, the cowed crusader is darker, sexier, and a hundred times cooler than ever before.

Writer/Director Christopher Nolan (*Batman Begins*, *The Prestige*, *Memento*), collaborated once again with his brother, Jonathan Nolan, and David S. Goyer (director of the "Blade" trilogy), to create this sequel to the 2005 blockbuster, *Batman Begins*.

Reprising their roles from the film's prequel are Christian Bale as Bruce

Wayne/Batman, Michael Caine as Alfred Pennyworth, Morgan Freeman as Lucius Fox, Gary Oldman as Lt. James Gordon, and Cillian Murphy as the Scarecrow. Maggie Gyllenhaal plays Rachel Dawes, a role which belonged to Kate Holmes in the previous film. New to the story is Heath Ledger as Batman's ultimate arch-nemesis, The Joker, as well as Aaron Eckhart as District Attorney Harvey Dent, and Eric Roberts as mob boss Salvatore Maroni.

Based on the DC Comics characters by Bob Kane, both *Batman Begins* and "Knight" are a reinvention of the Batman series and are completely unaffiliated with the previous Batman franchise.

This film is already making history setting numerous box-office records including reaching the \$400 million mark the fastest (18 days), beating *Shrek 2* (2004), which reached the amount after 43 days. In only six days, "Knight" also managed to make more money than the entire domestic run of "Batman Begins."

"Knight" continues to receive rave reviews from enthused audiences around the world. Fans and critics cite the performances, the directing, the writing, and the technical quality of the entire production to be behind the success of this top-notch crime-epic. Naysayers of the movie complain about the film's 152 minute runtime, its exhausting seriousness, and its soft PG-13 rating. However, everyone seems to agree that Ledger's terrifying portrayal of the film's sadistic anarchist villain absolutely annihilates any previous performances of the character, and will undoubtedly affect the way the Joker is depicted in the future.

It was reported that Ledger got his inspira-

tion from punk musician Sid Vicious and the character Alex DeLarge from Stanley Kubrick's 1971 movie "A Clockwork Orange." Living alone in a hotel room for a month, Ledger formulated the Joker's psychology, posture, and voice, and even began a diary of his thoughts and feelings to help guide his performance.

In an interview, Christian Bale said that Heath Ledger wanted to be beaten as hard as possible during the interrogation scene so that he could get the real feeling as it was happening. Having not met Ledger before, Michael Caine also reportedly said that during the filming of the scene where the Joker crashes the gala at Bruce's penthouse, Ledger gave Caine such a scare that the veteran actor forgot his lines.

Unfortunately, Ledger's bone-chilling performance will always remain a bittersweet triumph for his fans. "Knight" has been dedicated to both Ledger, who died earlier this year of a prescription drug overdose, and special effects technician, Conway Wickliffe from New Zealand, who was killed in a car crash while planning a stunt for the movie.

Not surprisingly, the hype for this movie was so incredible it seemed almost too good to be true. After being disappointed over and over again with Hollywood's brainless interpretations of some of the coolest characters in pulp fiction history, I had almost lost all hope in the comic book genre. The planets must be aligned just right or karma must be hard at work, because this movie managed to erase all of Hollywood's former mistakes and create a

new standard for comic book movies.

As the film came to an end, it took all of my restraint to keep from standing up in the middle of the theater and shouting "Hallefallujah!" For a full week after watching the film, I experienced something of a quixotic fervor, telling everyone from the birds outside my window, to my one-year old daughter to refer to me as 'The Dark Knight.'

If it isn't obvious yet, I'm totally recommending "The Dark Knight" for anyone up for an incredible mental and a visceral joyride. This movie has definitely scored the 'trifecta': you should watch, rent, and own it as soon as possible.

This film is rated PG-13 for intense sequences of violence and some menace, however, I would really caution parents to watch it first and then decide if you think your child can handle this movie's disturbing scenes.

Cut down on the coffee, brush up on your meditation skills, or learn a couple of yoga poses (I suggest 'turtle touches rock') to help keep your blood pressure down because August is proving to be a month of fast-paced action and excitement so palpable it can make the hair stand up on your head. Either that or August is the month for lightning storms and it's time for your yearly physical. Just to be safe, be sure to stay low during a thunderstorm, try to moderate the salt intake, and most importantly, always remember to be kind, rewind, and watch for this awesome movie at the theaters.

COM-FSM hosts PPEC to discuss future plans

The Pacific Postsecondary Education Council (PPEC) members held their first Pohnpei meeting from July 9 - 11 at the COM-FSM National Campus. The meeting was the first to be chaired by the PPEC new chairman, Mr. Spensin James of the College of Micronesia - FSM.

The meeting participants discussed the military buildup in Guam, the Pohnpei Accord (which is in regard to articulation of courses at the University of Guam), updates on United States Department of Interior's Office of Insular Affairs's year one implementation grant of \$500,000, and future collaboration among PPEC institutions among other issues.

The PPEC submitted a multiyear technical grant to the U.S. DOI earlier this year and has been funded at \$500,000. At their COM-FSM National Campus meeting, PPEC members agreed to fund boardmanship training for PPEC board members, training for chief fiscal officers, annual regional student learning outcome and assessment training, English as second language (ESL) training for faculty,

employment of the executive director, grant writing and administration training, recruit and hire regional research and assessment professional to work with PPEC institutions, administration of the grant, and attendance at quarterly PPEC member meetings.

The PPEC was established in 1981 as a nonprofit public benefit corporation to address the concerns and needs of Pacific island postsecondary educational institutions. The council consists of chief executive officers (or their representatives) of public colleges and universities in the American-affiliated Pacific Islands.

The conference, which was held at the COM-FSM National Campus Media and Instructional Technology Center, was attended by President Dr Patrick Tellei of the Palau Community College, President Mary Okada of the Guam Community College, Chancellor Dr Leon Richard of the Kapiolani Community College, Chancellor Mike Rota of the Honolulu Community College, President Dr Wilson Hess of the College of the Marshall Islands, President Dr Robert Underwood of the University of Guam, President

Spensin Jame of the College of Micronesia-FSM, and Mr Larry Gamboa as executive director of PPEC.

The conference participants were also treated to a courtesy visit to the President of the FSM, His Excellency Manny Mori. This was the group's first visit with a head of state.

The next PPEC meeting will take place on Saipan in October 2008.

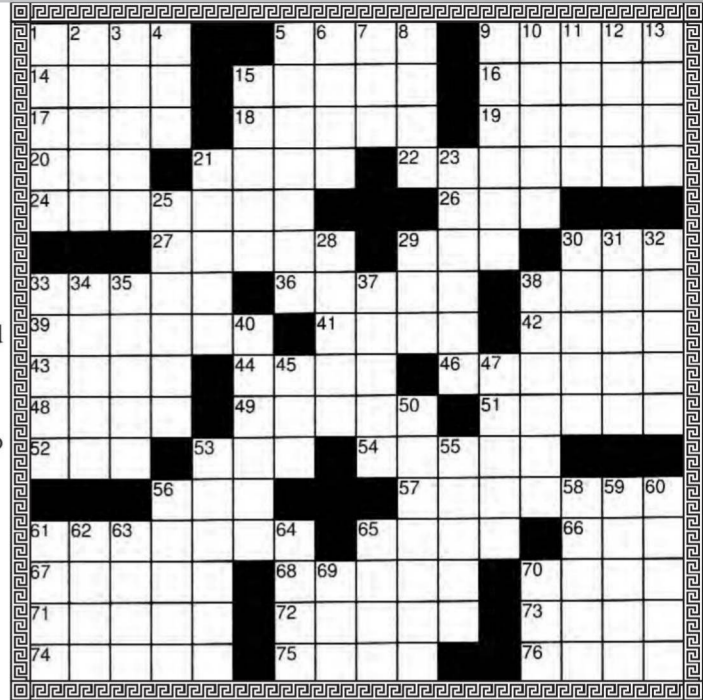

Catholic Mission completes another Higher Achievement Program

August 1 2008 again marked the end of a program that has been running for about 30 years. The Higher Achievement Program, perhaps better known by students and parents, as HAP has been a summer effort by the Catholic Mission to help better prepare seventh grade students from the Public Elementary School around the island to take the entrance exams for High School in the following year. It has helped the students to do remedial work especially in English and Math, helped their study habits and their socialization with students from outside of their own areas of the island.

The HAP program is now run by sponsorship of Pohnpei Catholic School under the direction of its Board and aided by instructors from Xavier High School, Chuuk. Instructors are Jesuits, volunteers and current students. The Principal for HAP this year was an Indonesian Jesuit Bayu Risanto, S.J. presently in his second year teaching at Xavier.

Thirty Nine students, 19 Girls and 20 Boys, under the direction of Bayu started and finished the program which ran for 6 weeks from June 23 -August 1, 2008. Classes were from 8:30am - 12 Noon each day. The students came from 16 different elementary schools. There is a very modest tuition for the program to help to cover some of the expenses. This year the tuition was only \$40 for the whole program.

Pre-testing and post testing demonstrated that 82% of the HAP student increased their test scores in English and 100% increased their Math scores during HAP.

Some field trips during the time helped the students to reflect on new and important

things. The first field trip was to the Micronesian Seminar in Kolonia where students were introduced to the resources available at the Seminar.

To help students to understand the FSM Government better they took a trip to the Capitol in Palikir and were given a guided tour by heads of different departments. A highlight of the trip was a talk with President Manny Mori who encouraged the students to stay in school and to make themselves the best that they can be for their own good.

Another day the students were met with representatives of The Conservation Society of Pohnpei and learned to better understand the importance of and need for Conservation in the life of all Micronesians

Some elective training was added on certain days by personal selection. Instruction was given in art-calligraphy, music and juggling. The elective classes were held for 30 minutes each. Every other day there was the opportunity for exercise through sports like soccer, basketball and volleyball.

The last day of the program was dedicated to the HAP Olympics in which most of the students participated. This was followed by a picnic and a graduation and award ceremony. The event was attended by some of the parents.

Parents and students entering the seventh grade in the next school year should begin thinking how they might be helped by this program during the next summer break. Watch for the announcements for the program which will be begin to be circulated in March of 2009.

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Sweet Rewards from Sweet Potato

If you could design an ideal crop, it would be one that was highly nutritious, easy to grow, produced a large crop for the amount of space planted, matured quickly, stored well, and tasted delicious. Then you should meet the sweet potato - a local food with all of these qualities. Sweet potato is also an important food since it can survive natural disasters like cyclones and floods to protect against food shortages and both the leaves and roots are edible. The roots are a good source of energy while the green leaves are a protective food full of vitamins and minerals.

There are hundreds of varieties of sweet potato, all of which share the scientific name *Ipomoea batatas*. Sweet potato roots have skin colors that range from light yellow to purple and flesh colored white, pink, purple, orange, and yellow. In addition to being a good source of energy for the body, the yellow and orange-fleshed varieties of sweet potato are also high in provitamin A carotenoids, which are important for healthy eyes, protection



against infection, and prevention of chronic diseases like cancer, anemia, heart disease, and diabetes. Sweet potato is also a good source of vitamin C. It takes only two cups of sweet potato for an adult woman to meet her estimated daily vitamin C requirement. Many of the nutrients in sweet potato roots are retained even after cooking. Mashing sweet potato with a little coconut cream makes a great weaning food for infants over 6 months and is a less expensive alternative to commercial baby food.

Sweet potato tips and leaves are an even greater source of important vitamins and minerals like calcium, provitamin A, vitamin C, and vitamin B2 (riboflavin). The darker the color of the leaves, the more provitamin A they contain. Sweet potato leaves are an excellent food for babies, pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers. One cup of cooked sweet potato leaves and tips provides an adult woman with 120% of their daily vitamin A requirement, 167% of their daily vitamin C requirement, 56% of their daily calcium requirement, 23% of their vitamin B2 requirement, and 19% of their iron requirement.

Sweet potatoes are best baked, boiled, or steamed depending on whether they are hard and dry (boiled or steamed) or soft, sweet and watery (baked). Whatever method you use to cook the roots it is important to keep the skin on as it helps keeps the vitamins intact. Cooking or serving sweet potato, whether it is the roots or the leaves, with coconut cream or a little of some other healthy fat helps the body get the most from the provitamin A. While the cooked roots make a nice addition to casseroles, cakes, and pies, the leaves are a great addition to soups.

Recipe of the Week

Meal in a Coconut Shell

Ingredients:

- 1 good-sized clean, mature coconut
- 4 small sweet potatoes
- ¼ cup coconut milk
- ½ cup green leaves (pele or sweet potato tips)
- ½ cup chopped pumpkin

Method:

1. Prepare the coconut milk, and keep the two half-coconut shells in a clean place to be used for cooking the meal.
2. Peel and wash the sweet potatoes.
3. Cut into small pieces.
4. Wash and chop the green leaves.
5. Peel and chop the pumpkin.
6. Place half of the chopped leaves inside a half-coconut shell.
7. Put all the other vegetables inside the shell.
8. Pour coconut milk over the vegetables.
9. Cover with the rest of the green leaves. Put the other half of the shell on top and tie tightly in place using a string.
10. Boil for about 45 minutes in a pan of water.

To serve: Open the shell and serve hot, or when cool serve cold with slices of pineapple

FSM Joins a Pacific Meeting on Banana Characterization

As related to the project by the Island Food Community of Pohnpei on conserving rare banana varieties, the gene bank collection of over 25 banana varieties at the Pilot Farm, and our work on characterizing bananas for their nutritional and other characteristics, Adelino Lorens and Dr. Lois Englberger participated in the Training Workshop on "Banana Characterization and Maintenance for Enhanced Utilization", held in South Johnstone, Australia from 28-30 July 2008. This was organized jointly by the Secretariat of the Pacific Community and the Queensland Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries (QDPI&F), and funded by the Global Crop Diversity Trust. The banana training is one of several activities contributing to the development of a strategy for the conservation and utilization of Pacific banana diversity. The banana training was conducted by Jeff Daniells, QDPI&F, and Dr. Angela Kepler, a Hawaiian traditional banana specialist. Other than the FSM, the countries represented by the 22 participants included Fiji, New Caledonia, Papua New Guinea, French Polynesia, Kiribati,

Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tuvalu, Vanuatu, and Australia. The participants learned the basics of identification of banana varieties, in particular those groups which are unique to the Pacific and the minimum morphological descriptors, including how to go about measuring and distinguishing these and taking appropriate photos for identification. For example, the male bud (sometimes called the flower), the petiole (the stalk below the leaf) and petiole canal (the cross section of the petiole stalk), leaf shape and the pigmentation of the underlying pseudostem (the main trunk), are among the most important parts of the plant for using to identify varieties, other than the bunch and fruit. Other parts of the training included: banana genebank management, germplasm exchange, pest and diseases/field identification, the Pacific banana strategy
