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Papua New Guineans rescued by “Yap Seagull” after nearly five months adrift

Palikir, Pohnpei—On November 23, 2014, at approximately 4:00 p.m., the Yap Seagull found a small stranded boat drifting in the FSM EEZ with 2 men from Papua New Guinea (PNG), Michael Bolong, 54, and Ambros Wavut, 28, located approximately 116 nautical miles south of Kapingamarangi Island.

The Yapese fishing vessel came across the PNG castaways after the men had been adrift for months. The Yap Seagull crewmen took the two men aboard the vessel and delivered them to the nearest port, arriving in Pohnpei on Saturday, November 29, 2014, at around 2:00 p.m. The drifters were cleared by appropriate authorities and claimed that a third person who was with them did not survive the ordeal. The third person, Francis Dimansol, 48 years old, allegedly died from severe health conditions

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Pohnpei Auditors check out Pohnpei Port Authority

Pohnpei, FSM—Pohnpei’s Office of the Public Auditor (OPA) recently released a performance audit of Pohnpei Port Authority (PPA) for Fiscal Years 2011 through 2013. The audit was conducted at the request of the Senator Steven Edwin, Chairman of Pohnpei Legislature’s Standing Committee on Public Works, Transportation and Communications. The Senator asked OPA to look into four

specific matters. Of the four, OPA found problems in three.

PPA’s Board of Directors allotted \$150,000 to the Pohnpei State Government’s Airline Taskforce. The allocation was approved by Governor Ehsa on July 13, 2012. If it had ever been formed, the Airline Taskforce would have been charged with looking for another airline service for Pohnpei but it was never actually created. Just the same, OPA found that PPA had spent \$62,836 of the \$150,000 allocated.

The audit provided examples of the types of expenditures that came from the funds allocated to the Airline Taskforce. \$4,000 was spent on travel for two officials to Majuro for a “meeting with Nauru Airline”. PPA’s General Manager authorized the travel. \$9,692 was spent for PPA’s staff members to obtain annual certification training. \$4,035 was spent to send two people to attend the Council of the Pacific Islands Traditional Leaders Conference in Guam.

The audit recommended that PPA’s Board of Directors instruct the General Manager to stop making further expenditures from the \$150,000 allocation until the Task Force is formally created and its members designated. It recommended that the funds it has already spent should be reimbursed before the Task Force members are designated and that the funds should be transferred to the Pohnpei Treasury for the use of the Task Force.

PPA’s General Manager agreed with the finding.

OPA was also charged with looking into the reasonableness of the increase in airport departure fees from \$10 to \$20 during FY 2013. PPA’s General Manager said that the reason for the increase was to accommodate the operating expenses of the airport terminal expansion.

Finding number two admits that the Port was operating at a loss prior to the increase in departure fees and that afterward revenues had increased. Still, OPA opined that the Manager should have prepared an analysis to ensure that the increase of the departure fee sufficiently covers the increase of expenses. They recommended that the Authority’s management should exercise good governance and ensure that increase in service fees are supported with analysis for purposes of transparency.

Again, PPA’s General Manager agreed with the finding and committed to doing so in the future.

Of PPA’s nearly \$4 million of revenue in FY 2013, \$224,300 (just over 5%) came from airport departure fees.

The third finding had to do with Travel Authorization (TA) procedures and implementation. OPA reviewed 81 Travel Authorizations and found 14 instances where travelers filed travel vouchers from as little as 16 days after trip completion to as long as more than a year late. Travel vouchers are to be resolved within 10 days of completion of trips. They found 13 instances where amendments to original TAs to document approval of additional travel expenses were not prepared and six instances where the travelers did not file travel vouchers at all.

OPA found the use of affidavits to support a car rental advance of \$455 rather than a receipt, as well as an affidavit of return travel to Pohnpei rather than a boarding pass.

In one instance it found that a copy of a car rental agreement dated July 12, 2012 was used to support the advance for a trip taken in June of 2012. There was no actual receipt.

One trip “did not materialize” but the money advanced to the traveler was not returned. Instead, the employee was making reimbursements through payroll allotments.

OPA recommended that the “Board of Directors and the management should take an active role to strengthen compliance with its travel policies by setting examples and providing for a favorable control environment.”

Again, PPA’s General Manager agreed with the finding and added, “Effective immediately, all travelers are provided with copy of the travel policy to be reminded of the 10 days filing requirement. Each traveler is briefed on required receipts that each has to submit to minimize and eventually stop the use of excessive affidavits.”

OPA was also asked to look into whether or not revenues were properly accounted for and disbursements were made in compliance with existing state laws and the Port Authority’s policies and procedures. OPA made no finding on that matter.

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
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Three Micronesian teens killed by hit and run driver in Guam

Gallen, 19; Saly Santos, 16; and Julia George, 16 were struck by a hit and run driver and were found lying unconscious on the side of Chalan Ramirez at around 4:30 in the morning.

Two of the girls were pronounced dead at the hospital that morning. One of the 16 year olds died at around 10:30 that evening.

Gallen, whose family is from Pohnpei was born and raised in Guam. Santos' family moved from Pohnpei to Guam when she was in middle school. George's family moved from Kosrae when she was just three years old.

The PDN says that it may have a suspect in the hit and run tragedy but that no arrests had yet been made.

A candlelight vigil in memory of the teenagers is scheduled for Saturday, December 7 at the scene of the incident on Chalan Ramirez in Yigo. Those interested in attending should meet at 7:00 p.m. Candles will be lit starting at 8 p.m.

Dolonier Village resident, Anna Wolphagen, had been living in her home for the last twenty years. Her only income is from FSM Social Security System and cares for her two daughters and three grandchildren.

Anna's house had been in serious need of essential repairs over the years. However, with her limited income, she did not think it was possible. Her roof had signs of leaks manifested by water drip marks in areas of the ceiling surfaces. Local untreated lumber, used as trusses, were rotting and insect infested. Exposed

and inadequate wiring made it a fire hazard and unsafe. The existing kitchen counter and cabinets had no protection from rodents and insects as the cabinet boards were made out of pressboard; wood framing and doors were insect infested with obvious dilapidation. Windows were missing the glass and screens. The existing bathroom had insufficient and malfunctioning fixtures and missing tile. The septic tank clogged due to its insufficient size. The internal and external paint was worn.

On November 26, 2014, USDA Rural Development turned over the keys to Ms. Wolphagen's newly repaired home. USDA assistance allowed her to make the necessary repairs and adjustments so she and her family could live in a safe and

rehabilitated home. "Thank you is not enough to express my appreciation to USDA and the Pohnpei staff for their concern and caring to solve my housing issue," said Anna.

With a sincere smile, Anna is given her keys to her newly repaired home.

Due to extent of repair needed, Ms. Wolhagen removed all her household items from her home, and moved in with her daughter next door. "I was so excited to see the progress each day. I'm so, so happy. I'm going to start moving in tonight!" states Anna.

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President Mori moving forward with United Revenue Authority

Pohnpei, FSM—During its recently concluded special session, the FSM Congress adopted a Ways and Means committee report (SCR 18-256) recommending in no uncertain terms, the passage of a bill that would repeal the 2010 law establishing a United Revenue Authority (URA) in the FSM. Still, Congress did not pass the bill repealing the establishment of the URA before their session that ended on November 29, 2014.

Meanwhile, President Mori is busily setting up the URA.

The Congress committee report said that during an oversight hearing held on November 19 they learned that the implementation of the URA will result in a cost increase. “The representative from CTA (Customs and Tax Administration) stated that the exact increase in the operations is not knowable until the URA is running in January.”

During its fifth regular session the FSM Congress passed a resolution (CR 18-220) asking President Mori to delay the implementation of a United Revenue Authority (URA) even though it was Congress itself that in 2010 passed the bill

providing for its establishment (PL 16-75).

The resolution claimed that “the Public Law creating the Unified Revenue Authority did not anticipate the current status of tax reform in this nation whereby certain states did not adopt tax reform legislation.”

Chuuk and Kosrae have adopted enabling legislation for tax reform. Pohnpei and Yap have not—each for their own separate reasons.

After the FSM Congress several times moved the date back by which all states were to have enacted enabling legislation before the national tax reform law could be put into place, they finally pulled the plug on tax reform as it stood at that time in the FSM.

Pulling the plug, or letting the “sun set” on the tax reform bill did not remove the law establishing the URA, but according to the resolution passed during the fifth regular session, “Congress has been advised and believes that having two concurrent national tax systems in the Nation is unconstitutional.” The resolution also claimed that “the maintenance of the Gross Revenue Tax would impose a disproportionate burden on those states that enacted the VAT (Value Added Tax).”

President Mori disagreed and is moving toward setting up the FSM wide United Revenue Authority as the law allows him to do. In a letter to Congress informing them that he would be moving forward with the implementation of the law, he wrote in Presidential Communication 18-383 that, “pursuant to separation of powers, Congress enacts the laws, the Executive executes the laws, and the Supreme Court interprets them.”

Congress adopted the Ways and Means Standing Committee Report 18-256 which recommended passage of CB 18-229 calling for the repeal of PL 16-75, the law that established the United Revenue Authority. “Your committee points out that the President is vested with the authority and duty to implement the laws of the Federated States of Micronesia in a manner consistent with the legislative authority in the law,” the committee report said. “In this instance, the President is acting based on a twisted interpretation of the URA and without the proper authority which expired when the Sunset Clause contained in the Revenue Administration Act (RAA) was not extended.”

“Due to the President’s stated reasons... and his unwillingness to cooperate with the will of Congress as expressed in CR 18-220, Congress has no choice but to repeal the URA,” the Committee report

said.

“Your committee would like to point out that by implementing the URA without all the pieces of the tax reform in place would result in unintended consequences and political fragmentation. The URA was passed with the intent to only come into existence and exercise authority once all four states passed the Value Added Tax. The piecemeal approach being advocated by the Executive branch is resulting in confusion,” the report said.

Though Congress adopted the report it did not act to pass the bill that would have repealed the 2010 URA act though that bill is still on the table. They decided instead to have consultations with President Mori before they meet again in January.

“Your committee would like to note that Congress remains committed to the tax reform process. Your committee encourages the advancement of the tax reform process and hopes work will continue to bring all four states on board,” the adopted Ways and Means Committee report said. “Additionally, your committee notes that Congress may again consider passing the relevant and necessary tax reform measures once all four states show the willingness to proceed with the process.”

Furthermore, the general public should take note that §301 of 37 FSMC requires no ‘insurance business’ be carried on in the Federated States of Micronesia unless the person or company engaging in insurance business is registered or licensed by the Board. Hence the publication required under §215 of 37 FSMC for the benefit of the general public. Any person or company engaging in ‘insurance business’ in the FSM not in compliance with the provisions of 37 FSMC may be subject to the applicable violation and penalty provisions of 37 FSMC.

that occurred while out at sea.

It was reported that Bolong and his nephew, Wavut, departed Lihir Island bound for Tanga Island on July 15, 2014, but the small boat ran out of fuel and went adrift after encountering stormy weather. The older drifter recalls the harsh conditions they endured including exposure to the sun and surviving off of rainwater and fish.

“After weeks, a month, we were forgotten” Bolong said, based on his experience with rescue missions being cancelled following failed attempts to recover missing persons.

The boat they were found on was abandoned after they were rescued. Only their personal belongings and boat engine were brought on board. Both survivors are fine and showed no signs of serious health problems after months of drifting although they were admitted to the Pohnpei State Hospital for observation.

Under the Admiralty and Maritime law of the FSM, the master of a vessel is required to “render assistance to any person found at sea and in distress or in danger of being lost if this assistance can be rendered without endangering the vessel, crew or passengers.” 19 FSMC Section 425. While it is reported that some vessels have failed to render assistance to persons that they encounter at sea who are in distress, the Yap Seagull performed admirably and rendered assistance without question.

Authorities from the FSM National Government, including the Department of Justice, Department of Health, and the Department of Foreign Affairs, as well as Pohnpei State officials including medical personnel from the Pohnpei State Hospital, met the Yap Seagull upon its entry to Pohnpei Port and provided further assistance to the two survivors. The FSM Department of Foreign Affairs is currently in contact with the PNG government in order to repatriate the drifters back to PNG.

The men were released from the hospital in surprisingly good health at 1:00 on the afternoon of December 4. Captain Taylor Santos of The Salvation Army said that he sent an email out to the Christian Ministries Association which received “awesome responses”. Pastor Rullens Phillip of the Assemblies of God offered clothing from his Super Saver store. Pastor Yasuo Yamada offered \$100 for food. The Salvation Army has already provided shelter, food, and clothing for the men as they begin their wait for repatriation to PNG.

Saint Barnabas Church in Kitti had arranged with Pohnpei State Hospital to deliver local food to the two men at the hospital on Saturday but since the men are happily no longer at the hospital, they will need to change their noble plans.

The humanitarian assistance team included David Mustra, PhD, EHS Specialist, Yap State Department of Health Services; Pius Talimeisei, Chief of Budget, Yap State Office of Planning & Budget; John Hasmai, Public Information Officer, Department of Youth & Civic Affairs; Venatus Etun, Coordinator, Micronesia Red Cross Society – Yap Chapter; Philip Raffilpiy, Senior Program Assistant, IOM Micronesia – Yap Sub-Office; and Mark Adams, Chief of Party, IOM Micronesia.

During their meeting, the humanitarian assistance team shared that with the assistance of the Micronesia Red Cross Society – Yap Chapter in soliciting food donations from the public and other assistance provided by the Yap Sub-Office of IOM Micronesia, the team was able to secure enough victuals for the migrants for a week or so. Upon arrival, concerned residents and

the local communities of Yap did provide for the refugees before a response team was officiated.

The victuals being provided by the public included local staple foods, rice, ramen, salt, bread, tea, sausages and vegetable oil.

Concerning the illegal fishers, the 4 Quang Ngai vessels with a total of 56 crewmen— according to the team’s assessment— may still have food for one week; however, the team has already started distributing food

supplies to those people as well.

In addition, the representative of the Health Services Department reported in the meeting that a medical team was ready to visit the migrants to provide medical examination in order to assess their needs.

Meantime, IOM Micronesia was setting up shelters at security parameters at the fisheries dock, moored for the migrants to use for the duration of their stay.

The group is trying to meet the needs of both the migrants and the fishermen during their time in Yap State of the FSM.

Editors Note: The FSM Congress passed a bill during its special session appropriating \$25,000 for humanitarian relief for the migrants and for the fishing crew. The funds are to be used for the costs of food, water, shelter, clothing, personal hygiene, essential medical care, and assistance for the passengers and crew members of the vessels who are without their own means.

Tension is mounting for FFA members at 11th WCPFC meeting

Apia, SAMOA - Pacific Island nations are racing against time to save their tuna stocks but their efforts are met with opposition from distance fishing nations (DWFNs), and time is running out.

Deputy Director General of Forum Fisheries Agency (FFA) Wez Norris said the meeting is a frustrating one for the FFA members. Time is getting short, but it seems all the proposed measures FFA put up for the meeting are being met with opposition from the DWFNs.

Pacific countries have put up proposals to better manage fisheries for Bigeye, Yellowfin, Skipjack and Albacore tuna, to tackle illegal fishing and protect endangered sharks.

Mr Norris said that for all the talk in the room at the moment, there doesn't seem to be any urgency on the part of the DWFNs to actually resolve some of the long standing issues of the commission.

Mr Norris acknowledged decisions are difficult.

"We are at the point that where they come at a cost to someone, and of course the difficult decision the commission has to make is who would bear the cost and at what proportion and that's what's holding back some of the discussion in some key conservation management measures," Mr Norris said.

"Our message to the distance fishing nations is don't just say no, if there is an issue that can be worked on, an amendment that can be made in the proposal, then let's do that and find a way forward," he said.

Two more days to go and it seems that many of the proposed measures that the FFA members are seeking may not resolved at this meeting.

But FFA Deputy Director General is still optimistic that the meeting may turn in favour of the Pacific measures.

If it does not, he warned, the consequences will be 'dire'.

NORMA deputy director calls for action to save pacific tuna

Apia, SAMOA - A new conservation measure to protect bigeye tuna is one of the top priorities for the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) at an international meeting taking place in Apia, Samoa this week.

Bigeye tuna is one of the four main tuna species fished commercially in the Pacific but its number has been shrinking- so much so that stocks are now down to just 16 per cent of their unfished levels.

Scientists are warning that Bigeye is overfished and have recommended a 36 per cent cut in the catch.

The FSM is one of a group of Pacific countries proposing to revise the conservation and management measure for Bigeye, Yellowfin and Skipjack tuna.

It aims to put fishing for all three species on a sustainable footing and effectively reduce Bigeye mortality.

Mr. Eugene Pangelinan, Deputy Director for the National Oceanic Resource Management Authority (NORMA) who heads the FSM Delegation sees the proposed Bigeye measure as one of the key conservation and management measures to be discussed at this 11th session of the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC) in Apia, Samoa this week.

The Commission brings the Pacific countries together with the powerful distant water fishing nations including China, Japan, Taiwan, South Korea, the United States and members of the European Union.

Bigeye tuna was declared overfished at this year's science

committee meeting of the commission.

FSM has serious concerns about the effectiveness of the measure since its adoption by the WCPFC in December of last year. The overfished status of the Bigeye tuna stocks declared at this year's science committee meeting of the commission has shown the lack of progress for the measure. FSM, along with other FFA members have identified the key issues as being the withholding of data on fishing operations in the high seas by long-line fleets that harvest adult Bigeye. This has undermined all efforts to assess and manage the Bigeye stock effectively.

Mr. Pangelinan says major cuts are needed in Bigeye catches by fishing nations, especially if any additional measures approved are to be imposed in 2015 and onward. The commission has to ensure it does not result in a disproportionate burden on Small Island Development States (SIDs) where most of the fishing occurs in their waters and where the SIDs depend on revenues from Licensing.

The WCPFC is an international fisheries management organization based in Pohnpei, Federated States of Micronesia that seeks to ensure through effective management the long-term conservation and sustainable use of highly migratory fish stock in the Western and Central Pacific.

Accompanying Deputy Director Pangelinan for the WCPFC are: Mrs. Pole Atanrao-Reim, Assistant Attorney General, FSM Department of Justice, and Legal Advisor for NORMA, Justino Helgen, VMS Officer and Bradley Phillip, Chief of Research of NORMA.

A lasting true friend of the people of Pacific island countries

Xi Jinping, President of the People's Republic of China

In China, Fiji is fondly known as “the emerald of the Pacific Ocean”. I still happily recall my stopover in Fiji five years ago when I was deeply impressed by the picturesque tropical scenery and hospitable people of this country.

Now, after five years, I will again set foot on this beautiful land. It gives me much pleasure to learn about the continued prosperity in the country as evidenced by its robust economic growth, steady progress in social development, improved living standards, and active participation in international exchanges. An important agenda of my visit is to invite leaders of all Pacific island countries that have diplomatic ties with China to Fiji for discussions on ways to further grow China's relations with these countries and jointly draw a blueprint for the bright future of our friendly exchanges and mutually beneficial co-operation.

Pacific island countries are important members of the Asia-Pacific community and the developing world. Since independence, they have made important headway in nation-building and economic and social development, and taken solid steps in advancing regional co-operation.

The friendly exchanges between the people of China and Pacific island countries date back to a long time ago. We feel a natural kinship with each other. For decades, mutual respect, mutual support, sincerity, friendship, win-win cooperation and common development have always been the key words in China's relations with these countries.

As a true friend of Pacific island countries, China stands ready to work on the basis of mutual respect and equality to deepen our win-win co-operation and provide more help to support their accelerated development so as to achieve common development and prosperity.

We shall be good brothers who support each other in both good and bad times. Sincerity is the key to a lasting friendship. China believes that all countries are equal members of the international community irrespective of their size, wealth and strength. China and Pacific island countries have similar historical experience, enjoy a deep traditional friendship, and share the same aspiration for a brighter future.

We thank the island countries for their valuable support on issues concerning China's major and core interests. China firmly supports the people of island countries in pursuing development paths suitable to their own national conditions, upholding sovereignty and development rights and interests, and participating in international and regional affairs on an equal footing with other countries.

We shall be good partners of win-win co-operation and common development. The Chinese people believe that “Giving and sharing does not mean losing.”

To realise the Chinese dream of the great national renewal, the Chinese people are making staunch efforts to comprehensively deepen reform, advance the rule of law and pursue economic and social development. The people of island countries are working for the prosperity of their national economies and expansion of regional co-operation. There is certainly room for us to align development strategies, leverage our respective strengths and achieve win-win results.

We will continue to do what we can to provide support and assistance to island countries. We will encourage more Chinese businesses to engage in investment co-operation with island countries, and help them solve the most immediate and pressing difficulties, take the challenges posed by climate change very seriously, help them better translate their strengths in natural endowment, environment and human resources into drivers for development and achieve common prosperity.

We shall be good friends of mutual understanding, amity and frequent exchanges. A long time ago, many Chinese came to island countries and worked with the locals. They lived together in harmony and sowed the seeds of friendship and hope. Since the founding of New China, many Chinese doctors, teachers, agricultural experts, engineers and technicians have come to island countries to work with the people here to implement economic and technical co-operation projects. They have also brought with them profound goodwill of the Chinese people toward the people of island countries. In recent years, more and more Chinese tourists have visited island countries attracted by the turquoise ocean, white beaches, coconut trees and unique cultures.

We welcome more friends from Pacific island countries to visit China, for sight-seeing, studying, doing business or other exchanges. We hope to expand exchanges and co-operation with island countries in culture, education, health, sports and between youths and at local levels so as to deepen mutual understanding and friendship between our people and pass on our friendship from generation to generation.

The people of Pacific island countries often say, “Our world itself is an island.”

The vast Pacific Ocean links China, Fiji and other island countries and, indeed, our hearts close together. China will be a lasting true friend of the people of Pacific island countries and will work together with Pacific island countries to shape an even better future for our relations.

President Mori meets President Xi in Nadi, Fiji

After attending the G20 meeting in Australia and visiting New Zealand, China's President, His Excellency Xi Jinping, visited Nadi, Fiji from 21-23 November to meet with the eight leaders of the Pacific island countries that have diplomatic ties with China (Fiji, FSM, Samoa, PNG, Vanuatu, Cook Islands, Tonga, Niue). President Xi's visit to Nadi is historic and indicates China's increasing support and strong friendship with these eight Pacific island countries. The visit was the first time for China at the Presidential level and was also the first meeting between President Xi and Pacific island leaders since taking up the Presidency in March 2013.

His Excellency President Emanuel Manny Mori lead FSM's delegation to Nadi where the two leaders met for the first time on November 22, 2014, for a bilateral meeting at the Frangipani Room of the Sheraton Hotel. During the bilateral talks, the two Presidents exchanged their courtesies and pleasantries. President Mori congratulated the two sides for the milestone achievement this year marking the 25th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relationship between FSM and China. President Mori took the opportunity to also reiterate FSM's unequivocal support and adherence to the One China policy.

Thanking President Xi for all the support China has contributed over the years to FSM's nation building efforts, President Mori sought President Xi's assistance in encouraging Chinese businesses to invest in the FSM in the areas of tourism, fisheries, agriculture, energy, transportation, and telecommunications. Noting the importance of balancing development and climate change, President Mori welcomed China and USA's recent agreement at the margins of the APEC meeting in Beijing to work toward reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

FSM and China have shared a fruitful relationship these past twenty-five years. President Mori noted the strong bilateral ties and encouraged President Xi for more people-to-people and cultural exchanges to further deepen the strong bond of friendship between the two peoples and governments.

The bilateral meeting concluded with President Mori and President Xi witnessing the exchange of the agreements and MOU between the two sides. Both sides had earlier signed an Air Worthiness agreement, an MOU for the construction of the Chuuk Administration building, and an economic and technical cooperation agreement for the value of ten million USD for projects to be agreed to later by the two sides. The two Presidents also witnessed the exchange of an agreement between FSM Telecom and ZTE for cooperation in the improvement of telecommunications in the FSM.

After completion of the bilateral meeting, President Mori joined his colleagues from the Pacific in a multilateral meeting with President Xi Jinping. In the multilateral meeting, President Xi announced China's policy for Strategic Partnership for the Asia Pacific region. He informed the Pacific Island leaders that China will add \$2 billion dollars more to the current \$2 billion for soft loans to assist in the improvement of infrastructure facilities and promote economic development in the eight Pacific island countries. In addition, China will increase its assistance in health, education, and technical trainings for the next four years.

Members of President Mori's delegation to Nadi included, First Lady Mrs. Emma Nelson Mori, Secretary Lorin S. Robert, Ambassador Akillino H. Susaia, Ambassador Gerson Jackson, Director Andrew Yatilman, Mayor Sefet Salle, Mr. John Sigras, and Mr. Brian P. Etscheit.

Australian Embassy celebrates International Volunteer Day

The 5th December is International Volunteer Day. As such, the Australian Embassy, Pohnpei, celebrates the contribution of Australian volunteers as part of the Australian Government's aid program in the Federated States of Micronesia.

Each year, Australian Volunteers for International Development (AVID) work with partner countries around the Pacific and the world, undertaking assignments in host organizations with the objective of promoting economic growth and poverty reduction.

In 2013-14, 83% of the Australian volunteers were sent to the Indo-Pacific region because of Australia's close connections with its surrounding region. In FSM, volunteers have been involved in programs including historic conservation, local food promotion, education and even the FSM Football Association.

"Our Volunteers are not meant to replace jobs", says the manager of Australian Volunteers International for the North Pacific, Dale Withington. "We place skilled professionals on long-term assignment to strengthen and support the work of their host organizations."

Australian volunteer, Mandy Flowers from the Island Research and Education Institute, is helping to create geographical databases about Micronesia's most outer islands. She

works with local communities to collect place name data for the outer islands. "I'm very excited about doing something that hasn't been done before", she says. "I'm most excited about taking this information back to the people who gave it to me... You should see how their faces light up when they learn something new about their island!"

April Turner, from the Island Food Community of Pohnpei says her work is "give and take." "I have been able to develop a strong commitment to local food systems and biodiversity... And in return I have supported a local non-profit organization in their service delivery and strategic direction."

Working with local communities across FSM, these volunteers have helped build solid and enduring relationships that will continue to foster and promote Australia's ongoing relationship with the region.

Globally, through the AVID program, Australian volunteers were supported in 43 countries to contribute to the Australian Government's development objectives. These volunteers undertook assignments across 1369 different host organizations.

A million USD worth of vaccines saved by a new generator

FSM Department of Health & Social Affairs received a new generator from the people of Japan through JICA's Follow up Cooperation on Project for Strengthening Expanded Immunization Program in the Pacific Region (J-PIPS). Despite the heavy rain and strong winds in the afternoon of 27th November, the Denyo power generator was successfully installed and tested at the National vaccine cold chain depot in Dekehtik.

The new generator replaced the 10 year-old generator which requires manual start, and was installed with an automatic transfer switch that kicks in 30 seconds in the event of power outage. The vaccine cold chain depot contains a million USD

worth of vaccines for the people of FSM. With the newly automatic generator installed, vaccines will be stored in correct temperature so that the services of safe and potent vaccines to all children in FSM will be ensured, and outcome of the J-PIPS Project which is to strengthen cold chain system will be maintained. "I am very happy to know that I can sleep well now" were the exact words expressed by Immunization Health Educator, Mr. Carter Apaisam. JICA Senior Overseas Volunteers, Ms. Mayuko Nakanishi assisting at FSM Department of Health & Social Affairs and Mr. Tatsuhiko Tsukakoshi assisting at Pohnpei State Hospital, also supported in the completion of this follow up cooperation project.

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IFCP launches "Let's Cook" local recipe book to promote local food consumption in Pohnpei



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Recipe: Micronesian-Style Yam Okonomiyaki

- Dried Fish (from Saimon's market), chopped into small pieces
- 2 pieces of fresh chicken, chopped into small pieces
- 1 cabbage, thinly sliced
- 2 small yams (sticky one is better), grated
- 3 eggs
- Flour
- Coconut oil
- Japanese sauce and mayonnaise

Mix the fish, chicken, yam and cabbage with the eggs and enough flour to make a thick batter.

Heat oil and fry thick pancake on both sides until golden brown.

After the Yam Okonomiyaki is fried, serve with sauce and mayonnaise spread on top.
